



2022 Old Bill's Impact Statements

Animals

Animal Adoption Center

We simply cannot overstate the significance Old Bill's Fun Run plays in the Animal Adoption Center's ability to save the lives of homeless animals. With the support of our dedicated donors, the CoChallengers, and the Community Foundation we were able to welcome 379 homeless pets into our adoption program in 2022. All of these animals were cared for by our loving staff, foster families, and volunteers. They also received any necessary medical care, were spayed or neutered, microchipped, and vaccinated prior to finding their forever families in the Tetons. We are grateful for this incredible event and the powerful impact it makes in the lives of both animals and people.

Animal Shelter-Jackson/Teton County

As a direct result of Old Bill's support, the Animal Shelter was able to provide necessary surgeries and microchipping, diagnostic testing and provide individualized care, food, and treatment prior to adoption. By spaying and neutering all homeless animals that have come to the shelter we have also been able to drastically reduce unwanted litters. Old Bill's funds also help in keeping the local feline population healthy by performing FeLV/FIV tests on every cat that resides at the shelter. By being able to participate in Old Bill's the donations fund wages for our part-time kennel technicians who are essential in providing love and care to our homeless animals.

Dog Is My CoPilot

Animal Transport programs are key to ending the euthanasia of adoptable animals because of shelter overcrowding. Thousands of dogs and cats have been saved by flying them from areas with not enough homes to regions of the country like Teton County where loving families are waiting to adopt them. Many of the animals you will see in our community have been flown by Dog Is My CoPilot and adopted through our local rescue partners!

Jackson Hole Horse Rescue

Old Bill's Fun Run Grant is the life-blood of Jackson Hole Horse Rescue. Without it we simply could not exist. In the past year we rescued 13 horses. We adopted 4 out. 8 horses died in our care from old age. The rest will likely live in our care for the remainder of their days, or we may find a home for them. Almost all the horses we take in are very old. It is a labor of love. We are truly an "Old-Folks-Home for horses."

Jackson Hole Police K-9 Auxiliary

Our grass roots organization could not serve the needs of our wonderful community without the ongoing support from Old Bill's Fun Run. Thanks to Old Bill's 2022, we were able to continue fulfilling our mission to provide financial assistance to local law enforcement. This year's significant expenses included specialized retrofitting of two new police vehicles to accommodate our expanding team of police K-9's and their hardworking officer/handlers. Providing veterinary care, pet food, supplies as well as reimbursement for team recertification are just some of the many other services paid for by our generous donors through Old Bill's Fun Run. We could not function in our current and future capacities without Old Bill's. Thank you for your support!

Paws of Jackson Hole

Old Bill's Funding had an immediate impact on local pets and their people in 2022 in several ways. With the housing crisis and inflation affecting locals, we saw a dramatic increase in the number of requests for financial assistance for emergency veterinary care and spay/neuter. We were also able to get back into the classroom to teach 4th and 5th grade students about responsible pet ownership and compassion for pets. We delivered another new training to our Disaster Animal Response Team, ensuring our community's preparedness to care for pets during an evacuation and we delivered thousands of free mutt mitts on our trails.

Teton Raptor Center

534 live raptor education programs for 23,384 participants of all ages. 14 raptor research projects conducted and



ongoing. 162 injured, ill, and orphaned birds cared for in TRC's rehabilitation clinic, with a survival rate of 60%. 7,270 hours of service contributed by volunteers. 727 Poo-Poo screens distributed to save cavity-nesting wildlife. 3,920 pounds of game meat scanned for lead as part of TRC's Sporting Lead-Free initiative. Completed the restoration of the historic Hardeman Barn as a home for world-class raptor conservation.

Arts & Culture

Art Association of Jackson Hole

Thanks to the support from the Old Bill's Fun Run grant, the Art Association of Jackson Hole brought visual art experiences to thousands of community members through classes, intensive workshops, youth summer camps, gallery exhibits, community outreach programs and special events. 2,100 children and 1,600 adults were served with 3000 hours of instruction. We proudly partnered with 15 local nonprofits and agencies to bring art education and therapy to low-income, senior, disabled, and other vulnerable community members.

Old Bill's Fun Run has a highly significant impact on Boundless by enabling us to maximize our donations with matching funds! This allows Boundless to provide for over 60 children annually the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities in arts, athletics, and educational programs that they wouldn't otherwise have access to, impacting many families in our community as well as supporting local lesson and programming partners and organizations. Cathedral Voices Chamber Choir

Old Bill's Fun Run is integral in the growth of our organization since the disruption of the Pandemic in 2020. It gives us the funding to support our local programming and expenses, and use other fundraising tools for development and growth for both personnel, board, and the organization as whole. This year we expanded our community membership in our volunteer choirs. Over 70 local singers and musicians participated in our performances this past year. Additionally, our education programming saw a surge, with 40 youth singing with Cathedral Voices. New partnerships have forged with fellow arts nonprofits and the school district, to improve music education in Teton County. If our children thrive in the arts, our community thrives also. Thank you.

Center for the Arts

The Center's 78,000 square foot, 3-acre campus is home to 21 Resident organizations. Last year, our campus was open 345 days. Center-managed spaces were activated 273 days of the year for events, of which over 95% are presented by local nonprofits. Hundreds of people of all ages work and participate in creative and educational activities at The Center. The Center maintains an exceptional, modern campus for Residents and community, and employs staff to support the arts and all the attendant activities. By administering the facility and providing support for Residents, The Center ensures that our community has access to the arts and culture, a central part of civic life in Teton County.

Chabad Jewish Center of Jackson Hole

The overwhelming support that the Chabad Jewish Center received through our 2022 Old Bill's fundraising enabled our non-profit to provide meaningful social and cultural gatherings that enriched the very fabric of our community cohesion and unity.

Dancers' Workshop

Dancers' Workshop (DW) entered its 51st year as a recognizable and enriching community staple. 2022's award supported dance education, performance and outreach to students and audiences of all ages. We provided live dance instruction to approximately 350 youth and 400 adults. Our outreach programs serviced 1,500 elementary aged children. We established a new partnership with San Francisco Ballet for our July gala, which will bring artists and staff together. Further, we continued our annual Winter Production, with a cast of 126 people. Between six different shows, we sold 2,391 tickets, and filled our theater at every performance. Two of those shows were presented to our local Elementary School Audiences, and 1,000 students attended. Philanthropic support has



been vital to our evolution and development. New projects in incubation thanks to OBFR include: our upcoming 2023 presenting season, new and sustained partnerships, bolstering our educational programming, and our outreach program.

Global Arts & Innovation Network

Since the pandemic, GAIN has continued to invest in our growing fleet of mobile teaching and performance studios and community workspaces. Last year we were able to upgrade our off-grid field recording equipment and install more permanent instruments at C-V Ranch, Red Top Meadows, and the Center for the Arts. Old Bill's continues to be an instrumental platform for smaller non-profits like ours to expand on these collaborations and grow our community outreach.

Grand Teton Music Festival

The 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run grant to GTMF provided musical opportunities to community members throughout Jackson Hole. The grant facilitated this impact by helping the Festival present 82 symphonic, chamber music, popular artist, education, and community programs in Teton County, WY that reached a combined audience of 19,328. Old Bill's helped GTMF distribute 4,488 free concert tickets to community members. Additionally, with this support, GTMF partnered with 22 local non-profits and businesses to share 45 free education and community engagement events with children and families. GTMF also continued its impact throughout year, reaching over 1,800 concert-goers and local students through concerts and musical events.

Jackson Hole Chamber Music

Last year's Old Bill's Fun Run grant made an enormous impact on our chamber music festival. Through concerts at Antelope Trails Ranch and Center for the Arts, we are able to delight hundreds of audience members throughout Jackson. The funds received will go a long way toward covering the cost of travel for each of our world-class musicians (and their instruments) to Jackson Hole. Flights into Jackson Hole are very expensive and over the past two years the cost of travel has increased significantly. In addition, we are currently working to upgrade our video and audio recording and live-streaming capabilities. This grant has allowed us to invest in these important structural upgrades to increase our audience and donor reach and bring world class chamber music performances to the Jackson Hole community.

Jackson Hole Community Band

2023 has seen continued post-COVID growth in the return of live music! We played ALL of our usual live shows this past year, and we even brought back a fan favorite event in "Tuba Christmas" for the first time since 2019. With the support we receive from Old Bill's we plan to continue our drive back to normal by presenting our local community with an abundance of live music and the ability to participate in the music process with us.

Jackson Hole Food & Wine

Our festival offers a unique cultural element and multiple opportunities for locals and visitors to connect with top local and visiting chefs, wineries, and beverage producers. Through our events we are able to expand the culinary conversation and provide an important platform to highlight our beneficiary Hole Food Rescue. In 2022, we were able to donate \$14,000 to their organization.

Jackson Hole Historical Society and Museum

In 2022 JHHSM welcomed 7,011 visitors to the museum and guided 134 people on historic downtown walking tours. One review stated, "Welcoming attitude by the employees, the museum is also very information packed with oodles to discover. It was a pleasure learning more about wonderful Jackson hole!" JHHSM led more than 30 youth programs for 800 students, including summer day camps, field trips, and lessons for both homeschool families and TCSD classrooms. JHHSM was able to host several adult education programs with over 400 participants. JHHSM assisted 154 researchers in 2022. The research and collections department assisted a number of requests this year from community members who were looking up their family ancestry and connection to Jackson Hole valley.



This work helps people forge a connection to a specific area, helps them to better understand their history, and promotes a deeper understanding of the importance of historical conservation.

Jackson Hole International Film Festival

The inaugural Jackson Hole International Film Festival will take place December 8-10, 2023. 3 days of film. A world of inspiration. This festival is the hub that connects our community with screenings of some of the year's best offerings in contemporary cinema, spanning genres from narrative to documentary films. The 3-day event will include film screenings with Q&A discussions with the filmmakers, and events celebrating everything film. See you at the movies. Jackson Hole International Film Festival participated in technical workshops with Jackson Hole High School Media Arts/Computer Science students. Students get to talk shop with film industry professionals while they practice and learn technical filmmaking tips. Guest speakers covered gimbal tips, camera settings, and editing tips. These hands-on sessions allow students to incorporate new techniques into their current tv/video projects and learn more about the filmmaking industry. We will continue with more technical workshops that complement students' curriculum.

Jackson Hole Jewish Community

Last year we received an unprecedented donation from Old Bill's. With these funds we were able to bring the Klezmatics band to the Center for the Arts for a night of Klezmer music. The band also taught master classes in Klezmer music to orchestra students at Jackson Hole Middle and High schools. All told we were able to serve around 500 Teton County community members! We also returned Estelle Nadel, Holocaust survivor/speaker to present to 1,000 or so members of our community at large as well as Teton County middle and high schoolers.

Jackson Hole Public Art

Support from Old Bill's Fun Run creates shared local public art experiences that build a cohesive, beautiful, and vibrant community. In 2022 JH Public Art hired over 30 artists and worked with 14 different partnering organizations to install art and provide free programs. With 9 local conservation groups we produced WildWalls murals including 14 murals and 9 educational augmented reality features seen by over 4,500 viewers. WildWalls had 4 free events, including a SteamRoller print exposition. 8 community artists offered free hands-on artmaking in the MobileStudio to 350 youth. 200 free art kits were delivered to neighborhoods. We provided production support for the new large-scale willow sculpture at the Center for the Arts. The free MoonShot 5x5, an inspiring public art pitch night, was attended by 150 people at the Center for the Arts. One artist won a juried award of \$3,000 to create a new public artwork. We installed 1 new ArtSpot seen by over 30,000 daily commuters.

Jackson Hole Symphony Orchestra

This year JHSO held two large free concerts at the Center for the Arts and dozens of rehearsal and master classes to prepare for those. With a couple of smaller chamber and house concerts scheduled for this summer we are excited to be able to continue to bring free concerts to our community while providing space and collaboration for local musicians to learn and grow in their craft.

Jackson Hole Writers

In 2022, Old Bill's funds enabled JH Writers to grow the Almost Authors Children's Writing Workshop, to develop new partnerships and programs, to support community writing groups in several genres, and to provide unique opportunities for dozens of local writers to expand and hone their craft. Thank you for your support!

Jazz Foundation of Jackson Hole

We are back into the "swing" of things! We are once again rehearsing regularly and exposing hundreds of locals and visitors to Big Band Jazz music through our public performances at no cost to them. We've recently added another two solid new members who are able to play with us and get a personal experience with this style of music. We bring the Big Band to Jackson! People would need to travel hundreds of miles to see anything else like us, but thanks to our funding through Old Bill's they don't have to. This unique style of music is available free and frequently right here in Jackson!



National Museum of Wildlife Art

In 2022, the grant received by the National Museum of Wildlife Art through Old Bill's Fun Run enhanced the organization's ability to impart knowledge and generate wonder through art and education. Over 55,000 people, both residents and visitors of Teton County, enjoyed exhibitions including "Bonheur & Beyond: Celebrating Women in Wildlife Art," "Scenes of Transcendent Beauty: Thomas Moran's Yellowstone," and "Wolves: Photography by Ronan Donovan." Additionally, 3,000 young children and 1,500 lifelong learners engaged with accessible and educational tours, programs, and classes offered by the Museum. These offerings would not have been possible without the support of the Community Foundation of Jackson Hole through Old Bill's Fun Run.

Off Square Theatre Company

Unrestricted funding made possible a triumphant year of gathering for live theatre experiences and theatre arts education at Off Square Theatre Company. By supporting facilities, salaries and administrative costs, funding from Old Bill's Fun Run made possible free performances for thousands of audience members at Thin Air Shakespeare, introduced hundreds of students to live theatre, and brought the community together for critical conversations. We are proud to complete a new Strategic Plan in January and look forward to five years of organizational and programmatic growth. Unrestricted funding is invaluable as we continue to operate beloved programs like the Youth Musical and Thin Air Shakespeare and find opportunities for new programs and ways to engage with our community. This is only possible because of the stability operational support provides. In the last year, Off Square served over 5,000 audience, 150 students, and 50 artists.

pARTnera

Old Bill's funding enabled pARTners to implement 16 integrated arts projects and 8 educator grants for classrooms throughout Teton County. Our program continues to serve 1,670 students in 15 different schools, employs 15 local artists and collaborates with 8 local organizations.

Riot Act Inc.

Funds received through Old Bill's help us to bring live productions and programs to the Jackson. Our productions foster new and veteran theatre artists in our community. We also provide challenging theatre to the Jackson audience. We offer many volunteer opportunities and open auditions for every production. We also offer discounts for students, seniors, and groups. Our productions over the last year included over 50 theatre artists. We also started an adult education program. We could not produce quality of work we do without your support. Thank you.

Teton Artlab

This program allows us to operate our Uncommon Art Residency with the Anvil Hotel and the Art Association each year. The program brings 5-10 exceptional visiting artists from around the country to live and work in our community for up to 3 weeks at a time. These artists work with teachers, students, artists, and observers in the studio and exchange knowledge through free artist talks and demonstrations. Last year over 400 individuals attended a dozen free events throughout the year.

Teton Music School

Founded in 2019, Teton Music School (TMS) had an historic year. More specifically, 2022-23 was our first full year in operation post-pandemic. This meant we were able to increase group classes and ensembles, reaching more people through music than ever before. TMS musical experts empowered more than 250 learners of all ages and abilities:

As we enter our 5th year of existence, the key to growth for TMS is to focus on establishing an operational structure that supports the musical opportunities our community has demonstrated it needs and wants, and that TMS can provide.

Teton Trust for Historic Places

With limited open land for sale in Teton County, the demolition of existing structures is a popular option for developers. As the demand for new homes in our community grows we're losing the neighborhood feel in our community as new construction is built out to utilize the entire building envelope. The Teton Trust provides historic preservation easements and monitoring. In short, a historic easement is a donation of the developable space around and above historic structures or landscapes. These development rights have monetary value and an easement formalizes the donation, enabling local government to negotiate LDR incentives or ordinance exceptions in return. The 2022 Old Bill's grant to the Trust supported the first easement in Jackson to include the transfer of development rights as an incentive. This easement worked well for the owner. Once publicized, we expect to replicate the process to protect more properties.

The Jackson Hole Chorale

Old Bill's played a substantial part of funding in FY 2023, as the Chorale celebrated its 40th year of operations. Two special concerts were performed with no admission fees. We offer high-quality music experiences to local participating singers as well as inspire audiences averaging 150-200 of all ages. Events include collaboration with other musicians to enhance the program with guest instrumental accompaniment. Our non-auditioned choir consists of 35-40 members attending weekly rehearsals, representing a diverse group of singers with varying levels of skill. We have participants who are differently-abled who can expand their musical talents and abilities. Dues are waived if a participant is financially challenged. We engage the community at large via outreach events, programs (e.g., short concerts at philanthropic clubs; the Senior Center; Town Square Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony; and local lodging /restaurant performances for fundraising) are important to enliven our locality with fine vocal arts.

Whit Press

Whit Press creates books that weave a rich tapestry of literary diversity that put words into action for the public benefit. Old Bill's funding supports project design, printing, communication outreach, workshops, and readings. Old Bill's helps us with utilities, equipment, rent, to pay local vendors, and local salaries.

Wind River Foundation

The generous support of the Old Bill's Fun Run community has been critical to the Wind River Foundation's ability to deliver on our mission priorities through the post-COVID transition years of 2022 and 2023. In response to momentum generated by wider social and ecological movements, the Wind River Foundation has aimed to achieve our goals through providing connections, education, resources, and through ongoing relationship building with other local nonprofits and organizations. We recently held our second collaboration with the National Museum of Wildlife Art in March of 2023, which reached 311 museum attendees, a follow-up to the March 2022 event reported last year. We are so thankful to the Old Bill's Fun Run community whose support has been essential to our being able to continue this work in Teton County.

Wyoming Highlanders

We funded our annual Robert Burns Night which celebrated the poet laureate of Scotland and provided the public with an opportunity to experience the music (bagpipes and Celtic singing), poetry and traditional foods of Scotland like haggis, whisky, and salmon. Approximately 100 people participated.

Wyoming Humanities

Our programs and partnerships impacted over 4000 Teton community members. We invest time and energy to reach underserved populations. We provide incredible opportunities to connect and educate about Native



American history and culture especially the Wind River Reservation. We have created successful dialogues with timely important issues in our community such as mental health. Through our partnerships we develop ongoing education of diversity, equity, and inclusion. We've had very successful programs such as our Tribal Talks at Teton County Library, standing room only!

Civic

American Legion, Jackson Hole Post #43

Scholarship for Boys and Girls, Donation for Girls Softball, and Monument needs/updates and Veterans' needs.

Cub Scout Pack 67

If Cub Scout Pack 67 has a great program, they will come. Pack 67's membership has more than doubled since last year. Our strong parental leadership is using the Cub Scout guide books that offer a structured program and using their imaginations to expand on that to ensure our youth have a fun time while learning outdoor and leadership skills

First Responders Support Fund

Old Bill's Fun Run Grant is used to provide training to our first responder community by providing the funds to assist with the cost of instructors and classes.

Global Ties Wyoming

The 2022 Old Bill's grant will provide operational funding to bring international delegations back to Teton County after a two-year hiatus because of the global pandemic. We hosted our first international delegation since 2020 last October when 10 visitors came to Jackson to discuss agriculture, trade, and food safety. They met with local producers, government agencies, and non-profits and spent a day in Grand Teton and Yellowstone National Parks. For 2023, we are already scheduled to host 20 visitors between two groups focused on adventure travel management and environmental conservation and wildlife protection. These programs provide an opportunity for business and community leaders from around the world to learn about Jackson Hole, meet with local leaders in the business and non-profit community, and share their culture with residents of Teton County. This grant ensures that we have the resources to continue this work and provide these opportunities to the community.

Jackson /Teton County Affordable Housing Department

Annually, the Housing Department serves thousands of community members through the creation of new affordable workforce homes, protection of existing workforce homes, and management of existing affordable workforce homes. All funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run are being dedicated towards new unit developments and to provide homes to families and individuals in need at affordable rates ranging from very low income to moderate income levels.

Jackson Hole Center for Global Affairs

The support of the CFJH through Old Bill's is vital in supporting and growing JHCGA's leading international and climate action programs. In climate, we directly link the Jackson Hole community in shaping state and national policymaking efforts that act on climate through platforms like the Coal Communities Roundtable, Global Change Series, and Jackson Hole Forum. We serve as a lead Jackson entity to host international speakers and create new Jackson inspired approaches to deal with global challenges working alongside Jackson community members, young and old.

Jackson Hole Working

Jackson Hole Working works locally to provide ways for the community to get involved in local issues such as housing, transportation and other issues affecting our small business community and locals. Our goal is to advocate and educate for a stronger Jackson Hole and its future.

KHOL 89.1 - Jackson Hole Community Radio

Funds from Old Bill's largely helped support our newsroom, which won numerous journalism awards this year,



including two prestigious Regional Edward R. Murrow Awards and eight distinctions from the "Top of the Rockies" contest through the Society of Professional Journalists (SPJ). These awards build on the recognition KHOL has received regionally and nationally over the past few years. At a time when many local news outlets are struggling to survive, KHOL is proud to be investing in more local reporting in western Wyoming and eastern Idaho. That investment is only made possible through community support for independent media in the Tetons.

Old Wilson Schoolhouse Community Center

The 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run grant allowed the Old Wilson Schoolhouse Community Center to perform necessary maintenance and repairs at the facility, as well as install an upgraded alarm system. We also used Old Bill's funds to support the annual Fall Harvest Fest in October, the Holiday Gift Show, and the 2nd Annual Community Gingerbread Exhibit in December. All of these events were free to the public, incredibly well attended, and received great feedback. Lastly, we used Old Bill's funds to pay the salary of our single staff member so that they could continue working to keep the schoolhouse beautiful, as well as maintain the facility as an affordable rental for our diverse array of user groups, which include numerous local non-profits, private citizens, HOAs, government entities, churches, and the Pumpkin Patch preschool.

Rotary Club of Jackson Hole Foundation

Our club raises and gives away over \$200,000 dollars each year to high school seniors for post-secondary education or trade school. Funds raised through Old Bill's each year compliment the funds raised by our club the rest of the year and make this a possibility for the last 20+ years. Last year we were able to give out 38 scholarships at multiple levels for students to follow their dreams with education and vocational training.

Santa Claus Fund

This past Christmas season 211 volunteers shopped and wrapped new toys and clothes for 576 of Jackson's children. The gifts were anonymously delivered, and we know that the Holiday season was happier for many families. "Santa" works closely with the Organizations of Care in Teton County to ensure that we find those who truly are in need and might not step forward on their own. If it were not for Old Bill's Fun Run we truly would not be able to give so much to so many at this special time of year. Thank you, Old Bill's!

Silicon Couloir

Silicon Couloir continues to offer world-class programming for entrepreneurs and growth businesses in Teton County. The 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run grant funded our organizational and administrative support for our core programming, demand for which has increased significantly post-COVID. This increased demand resulted in Silicon Couloir moving to all full-time, competitively compensated staff. The grant funded: our Start-Up Success educational "boot camp" for entrepreneurs; our free TEAMS mentor program licensed from MIT; our free monthly Chance Meetings networking events; vendor costs for our Annual Pitch Day (now hybrid in-person/virtual); managing the Cowork Space, including expansion of the space to accommodate increased demand; and administration of our growing Angel Investor program. Overall, the OBFR grant contributes to diversifying Teton County's economy as well as supporting a thriving middle class for current and future generations.

Teton County Access to Justice Center

It doesn't matter that we live in one of the most beautiful and affluent places in the country. Domestic violence, evictions, and custody disputes occur on a daily basis. Thanks to the funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run, the Teton County Access to Justice Center is providing legal representation and a voice to those who need it most. Old Bill's donations help provide representation for victims of domestic violence, translation services for the non-English speakers in our community with their attorney & at our free weekly legal clinics, and filing fees when people otherwise could not afford them.

Teton County Library Foundation & Friends

Old Bill's funding supports beloved programs and services at the Teton County Library each year. A vast print and digital collection, educational, creative and entertaining programs, access to technology, meeting and study



rooms, and welcoming gathering spaces, are only some of the benefits the Library offers for everyone, at no cost. We are pleased to share that funds raised from Old Bill's provided the following and more! Programs such as Page to the Podium, Mountain Story, Cabin Fever Story Slam, Night at Hogwarts, and Afterschool Activities were as popular as ever. New programs and services, such as Creative Aging, Library Table (a community workspace), and Library of Things were made possible. 395 Adult, Youth, Teen and Spanish-language Programs at the Jackson and Alta branches reached more than 8,300 community members. More than 3,000 books were gifted to children and adults via the Summer Reading program, the Library's Book e-Bike, Authors in the Classroom, and the SPROUT Book Mobile.

Voices JH

Thanks to Old Bill's we were able to cover our operating costs and pay full time staff members to do important work building social capital for immigrant families in the Teton region.

WyoFile - Teton County

With the help of Old Bill's Fun Run, WyoFile has informed and engaged the citizenry of Teton County and the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem by producing factual, in-depth, public-interest journalism. With more than 100 stories from the decisions made in Cheyenne, Rawlins, Washington, and Denver that have direct bearing on Teton County's economic, civic and environmental health, to events unfolding in our own backyards, WyoFile provided the community with the information it needs to participate in the democratic process, affect public land access and resource management decisions, and engage with civic institutions in the valley and beyond. Knowledge is power and WyoFile is proud to empower the community to define its own destiny. The community demonstrates its appreciation for this service and relies on it even more; as we doubled our newsroom capacity and broadened coverage areas, our readership has grown by almost 60% in the last year.

Conservation & Environment

Astoria Park Conservancy

With the support of over 150 families during Old Bill's 2022, Astoria Park Conservancy has provided a refuge for community relaxation and connection for over 150,000 visitors. Donations from Old Bill's allowed us to continue onsite wellness and education programs- providing essential experiences, requested by community members, such as hot springs meditations, swim lessons, and community conversations. We were able to continue a no-questions-asked subsidized pricing policy for all of our programs to break down financial barriers of entry. Funds were utilized to plan for the future 100-acre park, expand our Access Fund, create ties with new partner organizations, and engage over 2,500 community members in ensuring Astoria is an accessible and safe space for all. We are grateful for the support of the CoChallengers, the Community Foundation, and our growing community of local supporters.

Charture Institute

The COVID-19 pandemic accelerated many of the trends rapidly shaping the future of Jackson Hole and the greater Teton region, including increasing income inequality, increased pressure on workforce housing and community character, and mounting challenges to the region's environmental health. As the community and region emerged out of the pandemic, the funding provided by Old Bill's Fun Run allowed Charture to keep abreast of these trends, evaluate their effects on the community, and work with local leaders to help develop ways to address them. Put more succinctly, thanks to Old Bill's, Charture was able to further its work helping the region continue co-thriving.

The Cougar Fund

Education and outreach is our primary mission, and planting the seeds of the tree under which we will probably



never sit. OBFR provides us with the hours, the tools, and the inspiration. The ability to add our own charismatic, engaging, and compelling visual footage to our programming has strengthened our ability to connect people of all ages with the web of life and the ecological contributions of large carnivores as they co-thrive in the natural world.

Craighead Beringia South

This grant allowed us to pay the salary of our full-time wildlife biologist, who manages multiple wildlife studies in Teton County and lives locally.

Energy Conservation Works

Exceeded \$1.8 million in total residential and commercial energy loans. Increased Green Power usage by >110% since 2018. Saved >3,200,000 through new conservation projects (more than 38,400,000 kwh cumulatively). Distributed >1,200 Home Energy Kits to Lower Valley Energy members. Co-administered year two of the 'EV Experience,' electric vehicle loaner program. Secured \$ 5 million in restricted SPET funding for community energy projects. Selected for the US Dept of Energy's National Community Solar Partnership Technical Assistance. Hosted the 19th EcoFair.

Friends of the Bridger-Teton

The Old Bill's Fun Run Grant in 2023 was instrumental as we continue to scale up our operations in Teton County to pace the needed expansion of the Ambassadors for Responsible Recreation program which educates public lands users on how to safely and responsibly recreate and helps to mitigate human-caused wildfires, human-wildlife conflict, and reduces damage to our natural resources. The OBFR funds have helped FBT to grow staff and volunteer capacity to manage the ever-growing program and position the program and our organization for long term viability and success.

Grand Teton National Park Foundation

Funding from Old Bill's Fun Run 2022 enabled Grand Teton National Park Foundation to provide financial support for projects and programs that enhance and protect Grand Teton's treasured resources. Initiatives supported by Old Bill's included wildlife and natural resource conservation, youth programming, volunteer education and outreach efforts, preservation at the Mormon Row Historic District, and access improvements along the Snake River.

Greater Yellowstone Coalition

Teton County is a key region in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem containing the Bridger-Teton National Forest, Grand Teton National Park, Shoshone National Forest, rare and imperiled animal species such as grizzly bears, bison, wolves, and native trout, as well as some of the nation's most pristine waters. Funding from Old Bill's allowed us to co-lead a working group of eighteen conservation, sporting, and quiet-recreation organizations collaborating to positively shape the upcoming Bridger-Teton National Forest plan. In addition, to protect wildlife, we worked to ensure construction of three underpasses on Hwy 22 & 390 near the Snake River Bridge between Wilson and Jackson, we helped to secure an additional \$75 million investment in the Wyoming Wildlife and Natural Resource Trust Fund from the Wyoming legislature to help maintain open space and habitat, build wildlife crossings, restore degraded streams, and more.

Jackson Community Recycling/ Teton County ISWR

Donations supported measurable progress on the Road to Zero Waste. Initiatives included: the development and growth of a commercial and residential food waste composting program, participation in Zero Waste seminars, presentations, events, and publications, and reinforcing waste awareness and diversion through partnerships focused on Zero Waste demonstrations, as well as curriculum development.

- Collected 1,072 tons of recyclables from the community;
- Achieved a low 2.53% contamination rate among recyclables collected;
- Recycled and properly disposed of 57,000 pounds of Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) and 131,200 pounds of Electronic Waste;



- Continued to develop and grow a food waste composting program and composted 81.02 tons of food waste;
- 246 residential participants averaging two 5-gallon containers of food waste dropped off at the Recycling Center;
- Collected over 136 tons of yard waste material between the Spring and Fall Clean Up events and 34 tons of Christmas trees.

Jackson Hole Climate Action Collective

The funds received from Old Bill's Fun Run have enabled us to raise the profile of climate-related issues. We conducted several outreach and education activities, foremost of which was hosting the world-renowned architect Jason McLennan. The concepts he presented are still being discussed as the community continues to grow. We have also completed a 2-year long project of publishing a Climate Action Roadmap, which will be an essential community resource for spurring dialog and action around mitigating and adapting to the climate crisis.

Jackson Hole Conservation Alliance

Old Bill's Fun Run is a chance for the entire community to make philanthropy a practice. Many of our donors only donate through Old Bill's, as they know their donations will be even more impactful. OBFR also introduces our organization to new donors. In 2022, this support allowed us to hire a Community Planner, a position critical to help us further our mission considering the current projects that we are undertaking. It also helped us maintain our current level of staffing.

Jackson Hole Ducks Unlimited

JHDU has been working in partnership with Ducks Unlimited Nationals, and the Wyoming Game & Fish Department, to restore the South Park Feed Grounds. That project commenced in May 2022, and is nearing completion. Previous years Old Bill's Fun Run funds have been instrumental in bringing this project to fruition and we are excited about the Project's completion and dedication. As noted in last year's report, we are now pursuing a follow-up project in partnership with Ducks Unlimited National and Astoria Park Conservancy. The project remains in the design phase and should be heading to bidding and project planning in the fall. This project is for the restoration of three ponds and one seasonal pond and the surrounding habitat, together with plans for walking trails and educational components, in the Snake River Canyon, on property owned by the Astoria Park Conservancy.

Jackson Hole Land Trust including R Park

Last year's Old Bill's Fun Run grant directly supported the JH Land Trust's land protection, stewardship, and community conservation initiatives in Teton County. The JHLT conserved 161 acres of open space which safeguard vital wetlands and high-quality big game habitat. We also launched a new membership program where over 110 members directly supported community conservation spaces, events, and programming. The Land Trust partnered with 27 different local organizations who hosted free and diverse programming opportunities at JHLT community open spaces. We sought feedback from community members, partners and supporters to revise our 5-year strategic plan to recommit our top priorities as an organization with the overall goal of bringing more people to the shared vision of protection and conservation.

Jackson Hole Wildlife Foundation

In 2022, Old Bill's Fun Run supported the following:

- Produced an up-to-date Teton County Wildlife-Vehicle Collision Database Summary Report, to continue guiding conservation planning when it comes to transportation developments
- Newly banded 425 birds for research on songbird productivity and survivorship (43 different species).
- Installed a series of "wildlife ramps" along the Snake River levee for easier navigation by wildlife
- Hired a full-time Program Manager for Bear Wise Jackson Hole partnership, assisting homeowners with compliance with the new Wildlife Feeding Land Development Regulations for Teton County
- Created a fence inventory in core Sage-Grouse habitat in Grand Teton National Park and the Bridger-Teton National Forest
- Engaged tourists visiting Jackson Hole on what a wildlife-friendly community is and how to be a part of



stewardship through Being Wild JH

- Removed or modified 6.16 miles of fence on public and private lands
- Trained and certified 60 new Nature Mappers
- Launched a new Nature Mapping Jackson Hole app for iPhone and Android users
- and much more!

Jackson Wild

Old Bill's Fun Run grant funds were applied to supplement local infrastructure and expenses associated with creating and executing programming as an inclusive global forum, inspiring our community, and celebrating excellence in storytelling that illuminates our connection to the natural world and collective responsibility to the wild.

LegacyWorks Group

Last year's Old Bill's funds supported LegacyWorks' efforts to accelerate community driven action for a better future in myriad focus areas. In the last year, opportunities and partnerships across our projects in water initiatives, wildlife migrations and habitat, climate action, agriculture, community resilience, and data leadership have expanded. We're working closely with roughly 20 agencies and organizations on 5 unique projects to advance work that is greater than the sum of its parts. By leveraging networks, adding additional expertise and capacity, and providing project management and facilitation, our nimble team dutifully and humbly supports local and ecosystem scale initiatives that have been identified as priorities by our community partners.

National Parks Conservation Association

Old Bill Fun Run supports the Grand Teton Field Office of the National Parks Conservation Association and enhances the overall program capacity to preserve and protect Grand Teton National Park and the surrounding natural landscape. Specifically, Old Bill's helps to advance our campaigns to preserve our area's unique wildlife, protect migration corridors and safe road crossings, and maintain wildlife habitat, clean air, and water. The field office also works to promote the Zero Waste Partnership that has supported recycling and diverted tons of trash from the national park and landfill each year. These efforts are critical to preserve one of our country's crown jewels - Grand Teton National Park - for residents, visitors, and future generations to enjoy.

Northern Rockies Conservation Cooperative

NRCC works to create a fair and decent community within a healthy environment. We achieve this goal by supporting independent conservation, research, and community-building projects in Teton County, improving scientific understanding, and contributing to solving our region's many interrelated challenges. This past year, our Research Associates monitored ecological and climate change in wildflowers, whitebark pine, amphibians, and trumpeter swans; enacted conservation measures to protect species; incorporated citizen science; and participated in many storytelling initiatives (i.e. For Everything There Is a Season (video), An Evening of Backcountry Tales (event), Quiet Knowledge (podcast), and many more). We also helped launch a new project called, "Greater Yellowstone Seasonal Almanac." Additionally, we hosted three young professionals as interns and supported visiting researcher projects. All this work and more is supported by the Old Bill's Fun Run grant.

Protect Our Water Jackson Hole

In 2022, Protect Our Water Jackson Hole (POWJH) worked closely with the County on the Water Quality Master Plan. The Town of Jackson requested POWJH to participate in reviewing the Wastewater Treatment Plant. We continue to focus on educating the community about the adverse effects of wastewater, fertilizers, stormwater, and livestock. POWJH did significant community outreach for the Water Quality SPET measure. It was the most supported SPET measure in history. There are once-in-generation funds for water and wastewater infrastructure through the American Rescue Plan Act and the Infrastructure Bill. These SPET funds will help leverage these much-needed state and federal funds.



Raynes Wildlife Fund, Meg and Bert

We had the highest number of applications ever and were able to give out a record number of 16 research and outreach grants which benefit wildlife species large and small and also support young researchers, wildlife professionals, and citizen scientists in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. Thank you donors!

Responsible Growth Coalition

RGC was instrumental in getting a public opinion survey on the proposed Tribal Trail Connector which shows that the community is opposed to it on a 2:1 ratio. We lobbied the County Commissioners to create a cost/benefit analysis on the proposed road and wrote several letters to the editor/guest shots tracking the roads transfer from the Commissioners to WYDOT and our disappointment in that process. In an effort to educate the community about the environmental hazards of a proposed Tribal Trail, we commissioned an artist to do a before and after shot of the scenic tribal trail pathway for an advertisement. We also ran ads in the Jackson Hole News & Guide that reached about 10,500 readers per day and an additional 2,000 readers online about the potential cost and expensive litigation that may ensue if the road is built. We researched alternative transportation options in mountain towns and paid parking as a disincentive to drivers. We also recruited a new board member with extensive experience with public works projects and the impact of induced demand, the concept that more pavement leads to more traffic.

Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Jackson Hole Chapter

The non-native invasive annual, cheatgrass continues to be present and spread into new areas of Teton County where it can severely impact native plant communities by altering fire regimes and outcompetes native plants. 4,733 total acres will be treated throughout the Gros Ventre, Snake, and Hoback drainages, and National Elk Refuge, BTNF, state, county, town, and private lands. Funds raised will be used to purchase the herbicide and/or contract labor for aerial spraying. Project is ongoing with Teton County Weed & Pest in coordination with Wyoming Game & Fish. Objective is to stop the expansion of cheatgrass into un-infested rangelands and increase the productivity and health of our native habitat for the benefit of the Jackson and Fall Creek elk herds, bighorn sheep, mule deer, moose, and sage grouse.

Sierra Club Wyoming

As restrictions imposed by the Covid pandemic eased, we were able to gradually resume in-person meetings and events, supplemented by online programming. Using this hybrid in-person and virtual approach, we connected with over 570 people, educating and inspiring them to work on a variety of conservation issues in Teton County ranging from wildlife habitat protection to achieving carbon neutrality. We guided three local outings to help residents explore and enjoy nature while learning about local issues; hosted listening sessions to learn directly from community members about conservation priorities; and held other outreach events to help volunteers and grassroots leaders support effective administrative advocacy on public land and wildlife issues in Teton County. Our supporters' continued investment in our work through Old Bill's Fun Run is essential to helping us achieve our conservation goals in northwestern Wyoming, as our new staff starts in Jackson in June (working from a local office).

Slow Food in the Tetons

In 2022, Slow Food strengthened our community food system, offered a variety of new and recurring food-based educational and outreach opportunities, and secured funding to implement the new Local Food Discount Program to increase access to locally produced food. We enjoyed continued growth of the Summer and Winter People's Markets, Online Marketplace, and Farm Stand, contributing to a total of \$772,000 paid directly to farmers, ranchers, and food producers through Slow Food programs. We ran five Cooking & Farming Summer Camps and weekly online cooking classes during the school year, including a second year of adult cooking classes in partnership with Teton Literacy Center. We managed 155 Community Garden plots, supported by an impressive 2,000 gardener volunteer hours, including 7 monthly educational garden events and presentations that were open and free to the public. The Farm to Fork Festival was the largest to date, featuring an impactful keynote presentation by Sean Sherman, the first ever Rise and Brine community food preservation endeavor, and a free



100% locally sourced lunch for 250 people. We successfully launched the third year of the Teton Farmer Fund, which disbursed \$27,500 in grant funds to three local farms.

Snake River Fund

Contributions generated through Old Bill's Fun Run allowed Snake River Fund to -

- 1) Expand the organizational capacity of the Snake River Fund for the first time in our history;
- 2) Continue to fund an important water quality monitoring site on the Hoback River in partnership with the US Geological Survey;
- 3) Finance crucial stream rehabilitation projects in collaboration with our partners;
- 4) Support outreach and educational programs for Teton County School District students, including Snake River Days summer Camp and 5th Grade Floats; and
- 5) With partnering organizations, we are continuing to support an annual Women's Swift Water Rescue Clinic for financially underprivileged women in Teton County.

The Nature Conservancy in Wyoming

Old Bill's empowered The Nature Conservancy (TNC) in Wyoming to engage Teton County community members in meaningful conservation efforts. Our Wildflower Watch program, led in English and Spanish, invites volunteers to learn about climate change impacts by collecting data on the seasonal timing of the flowering and fruiting of plants. We've worked with 750+ volunteers whose efforts are directly benefitting land management projects like Grand Teton National Park's Kelly Hayfields Habitat Restoration. Old Bill's also supported Neighbors to Nature, a collaboration with nonprofits and Bridger Teton National Forest to quantify recreation use and impact on the forest. Further, Old Bill's supports TNC's Fire on the Mountain project which integrates native plant restoration into a publicly accessible program via the Greater Yellowstone Botanical Tour at the National Museum of Wildlife Art. The associated research and education support Teton County in preparing for and being able to recover from future fires.

The Riverwind Foundation

Old Bill's Fun Run provided funds for supporting the Jackson Hole & Yellowstone Sustainable Destination Program to (1) implement the BEST Sustainability Certification program for training and certifying those businesses and organizations most committed to sustainability, (2) conduct the Sustainable Business Leaders (formerly RRR Business Leaders) program with ~180 businesses and organizations (3) publish the Green Matters in Jackson Hole sustainability Magazine and Sustainable Business Guide distributed to over 7,800 subscribers, (4) research and report on solutions to visitor and resident impacts on our environment, community, and economy. Positive community impacts include reducing energy, fuel, and water use; lessening waste to the landfill; reducing carbon emissions; improving air and water quality; protecting wildlife and wild lands; and growing the next generation of green leaders.

The Wilderness Society

Old Bill's helps The Wilderness Society in our mission to protect landscapes on the 3.4-million-acre Bridger-Teton National Forest, protect the public ownership of public lands, and provide agencies with public land management recommendations. We are currently working with a group of 18 conservation and outdoor recreation advocates who collaboratively develop conservation and recreation proposals as input for the Forest Service as it begins the revision of its forest management plan. We also work on projects of local interest such as the protection of ungulate migration corridors. Old Bill's donations significantly enhance our ability to build coalitions with multiple local grassroots and grassstop organizations and help us develop relationships with local, state, and federal agencies. With your support, our goal of ensuring lasting protection for public land will impact visitors to our county, over 22,000 Teton County residents, and many future generations.

Trout Unlimited - Jackson Hole Chapter #051

Old Bill's Fun Run is essential to the Jackson Hole Chapter of Trout Unlimited's efforts to conserve, protect, and reconnect watersheds within Teton County. Funds raised directly support youth and community education,



outreach, and project work in Teton County. In addition, OBFR funds support a full-time dedicated staff position in collaboration with state and national TU organizations. OBFR funds supported the development and implementation of conservation projects on the Gros Ventre River and Crystal Creek, Lava Creek, Flat Creek, and spring creeks of Snake River Ranch. OBFR also supported Jackson Kids Fishing Day and the Jackson Adopt-a-Trout Youth Education program. JHTU engaged volunteers in our work and JHTU funds were leveraged with federal, state, nonprofit, foundation, and private funding and in-kind contributions of materials and staff time.

WYldlife For Tomorrow

The Old Bill's Fun Run funding contributed to several WYldlife For Tomorrow projects that were funded through partnerships with other NGO's in Teton County. Examples are the South Park Wetlands restoration project, The Kelly Hayfield, and Spread Creek Fish Passage projects. Through partnerships such as these, wildlife conservation serves everybody in Teton County, both residents and visitors alike. These impacts are world reaching and extremely impactful for generations to come!

Wyoming Alliance for Environmental Education

We finished our commitment to Leap into Science, a program for preschool and after-school educators to introduce young children and their families to science and exploring the environment. This involved a workshop for educators, a kit for each educator of teaching materials, and a collection of books (some in Spanish). Four educators in TCSD and Teton Literacy were trained. We estimate that translates to 80 students/yr will be directly impacted. We created a new listserv for environmental educators to share resources and opportunities; we are in the process of creating online professional development program to serve both informal educators and classroom teachers.

Wyoming Outdoor Council

Old Bill's funding made it possible for us to fight for clean water throughout Teton County, advocate for conservation and sound management of the Bridger-Teton National Forest, work to preserve the integrity of wildlife and big-game migration corridors in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem, support grassroots organizing efforts around climate change, and improve solar and other renewable energy policies for our region. Old Bill's funding is essential to our ability to stand up for long-held conservation values that Teton County holds dear.

Wyoming Untrapped

WU fosters productive relationships with Wyoming Game and Fish Department employees, commissioners, and constituents to negotiate the modernization of trapping and snaring regulations, ultimately decreasing or ending conflicts with people, pets, and non-target wildlife. WU builds allyships with other organizations and individual supporters to better engage the public to influence regulation reform. The "Untrap Pack" provides a toolkit for facilitating the release of dogs/people after accidental trapping/snaring. This complements our "Trap Safety for Pet Owner" brochure and online how-to and informational videos. WU monitors accidental trapping/snaring incidents via public records requests, social media, news articles, and direct contact with victims or community members. When granted permission, we upload information to our Trapping Incident Map. Our Beaver Dam Cam and Coexistence Program continues to promote awareness of the value of this critical eco-engineer and share techniques to facilitate living with beavers as an alternative to lethal trapping.

Wyoming Wetlands Society

The Wyoming Wetlands Society was able to use Old Bill's grant monies to benefit the community by giving multiple tours of our facilities and presentations at swan releases to spread education and enthusiasm for wildlife and the importance of wetlands. We also put together a paper on our captive breeding program for publication to help other programs during their development. We installed floating islands, repaired others, and provided nesting materials for wild swans throughout the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. We live trapped over 80 beaver last year from "problem" areas and relocated them to suitable habitat on permitted National Forest areas in need of wetland restoration, improving water retention on land at vital headwater areas. We also began work on a beaver



holding facility so we can hold families for release together, increasing their chances of successful reintroduction. Our wetland improvement work benefits all users, wildlife and humans, for future generations.

Wyoming Wilderness Association

Wyoming Wilderness Association's (WWA) work protecting our public wildlands in Teton County is only possible because of the generous support from Old Bill's CoChallengers and donors. As a grassroots organization, participation in Old Bill's brings critical financial and community support to our mission. The donations received have helped grow our stewardship and educational programming. In 2022, 85 volunteers accrued nearly 600 hours in stewardship projects near the Gros Ventre Wilderness or solitude monitoring training and data collection at 12 locations across the Bridger-Teton and Caribou-Targhee National Forests. We also partnered with Coombs Outdoors and the Northern Arapaho Tribal Historic Preservation Office to lead 10 high school students into the Palisades Wilderness Study Area for a wildland stewardship day told through multiple cultural lenses. Old Bill's support allows us to maximize our impact, strengthen our community culture of conservation, and ensure future generations can experience and appreciate our wildlands and heritage.

Wyoming Wildlife Advocates/JH Bear Solutions

Old Bill's funds made it possible for us to serve the community with 119 life-saving bear-resistant trash cans that we distributed across the county and town. The funds also allowed us to continue to print our popular wildlife guides that are used in GTNP and across the county to help people understand the challenges that wildlife face here. Having overhead support for salary also assisted in keeping two individuals employed at our organization which contributes to a strong economy in our community.

Wyoming Wildlife Federation

The contributions from the Old Bill's grant have allowed WWF to serve the Jackson community through ecology including working with local agencies particularly the Bridger Teton National Forest and NGOs on conservation issues, holding Wildlife on Tap education events for adults, creating and teaching place-based education camps for children, and administering the Hunters for the Hungry program connecting hunters to local food banks. Through these contributions, WWF has been able to give back and better connect the community to the local ecosystem.

Yellowstone-Teton Clean Cities

Old Bill's Fun Run funds make it possible for YTCC to continue to provide outreach and education to our local community. When it comes to promoting alternative fuels and reducing petroleum usage, a huge barrier is lack of education. We utilize these funds yearly to have a larger impact on the events we host and the materials and resources we can offer to educate the public on the importance of sustainable transportation and reducing greenhouse gas emissions from petroleum usage. In Teton County, 60% of local emissions are from ground transportation. With this funding, we can reach new and underserved members of the community and make them aware of this statistic and the importance of electrifying and creating more sustainable transportation options.

Education

Boy Scouts Venture Crew 407

Last year's funding allowed us to purchase ski passes for 4 crew members so they could train with TCSAR in professional avalanche training during the winter. It also helped provide meals during monthly early morning trainings before school for an average of 10 crew members per training.

Bridger-Teton Avalanche Center Foundation

Donations allow the Bridger-Teton Avalanche Center Foundation to support the operations of the Bridger-Teton Avalanche Center. The Center provided 166 days of daily avalanche forecast over 7000 square miles of Western Wyoming last winter. Over 125,000 individual users and millions of page views allowed recreation and commercial winter backcountry travelers to make informed decisions regarding travel in avalanche terrain. This funding also improved our website and online outreach capabilities to better serve the community.



Central Wyoming College - Jackson

Central Wyoming College has been serving the Teton County community for over forty-five years. We are committed to meeting the valley's educational and workforce needs and providing educational opportunities for locals from all walks of life. Our entrepreneurial approach to developing and delivering programs allows us to nimbly adapt to changing needs and provide outstanding service to Jackson and beyond. Education is the cornerstone of any society. A study commissioned by the state found that in Jackson, for every \$1 invested in education from CWC, on average, yields \$4.50 in benefits to the county. We are able to provide a brighter future to individuals who already live and work in Teton County. We also provide 2- and 4-year degrees for anyone who is place-bound.

Charles Reid Schouboe Memorial Scholarship Fund

The moneys generated by Old Bill's go directly back to the community through scholarships awarded to students from Teton County.

Children's Learning Center

Old Bill's Fun Run is Children's Learning Center's largest annual fundraiser and "friend-raiser." With support through Old Bill's, we continued providing affordable, high-quality, inclusive childcare for local families across the economic spectrum (40% of CLC families receive tuition assistance). We served over 1,000 children through a continuum of early education programs, including Head Start, Early Head Start, childcare, and Special Education. We also provided more than 700 free developmental screenings and served nutritious, home-cooked meals and snacks to 150 children daily.

City Kids Wilderness Project

Through Old Bill's, 130 City Kids youth, ages 11-18 experience ranch camp and local internships, learning outdoor skills, teamwork, preparation, and goal-setting. These experiences translate into critical life skills that expand their sense of personal possibility. 97% of City Kids program graduates also graduate from high school and 92% enroll in college, earn a GED, or pursue other vocational programs.

Cub Scout Pack 268

The funds received last year went a long ways to make scouting affordable to all who wanted to participate by purchasing derby cars, first aid supplies, covering entrance fees and more. They enabled the cub scouts to always be fed and equipped during their numerous volunteer events which included the elk antler pickup, town clean-up day, flag day, scouting for food drive, and other events.

C-V Ranch Residential Treatment Facility

C-V Ranch is a fee for service endeavor, so all donations enhanced and help expand certain programs. The donations made by Old Bill's allowed us to expand our general operating budget and programs. For example, Old Bill's funding allowed us to expand programs such as vocational services, break activities, and after school and weekend activities.

Davey Jackson Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution

The National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Davey Jackson Chapter, has three missions that guide our service in the community: Education, Patriotism, and Historic Preservation. We have a long history of supporting students through scholarships and essay contests. Funds raised support Teton County students who participate in American history essay contests and share their love and understanding of history through exemplary writing and citizen service. We focus on the following: Provide Jackson Hole High School college bound seniors scholarships as part of our chapter American History essay contest. Award a Good Citizen Scholarship. Award students in grades 5-12 monetary awards, medals, books, and certificates for participation in the National American History Essay Contests. Recognize an educator as an Outstanding American History Teacher. Our local students, along with our teachers, are the foundation for a strong future in America. With your help, we honored them.



Eastern Star Foundation of Jackson Hole

Our Eastern Star Foundation was established in 2008 for the sole purpose of awarding educational scholarships to current graduating seniors and former high school students attending college. Last year, we awarded four \$1,000 scholarships. Two scholarships of \$1,000 were awarded to Jackson Hole High School Seniors. Two additional scholarships of \$1,000 were awarded to college students attending Utah Valley University and Kansas State University.

Erin's Fund

We awarded three, one-time \$4,000 scholarships.

First in Family Jackson Hole Scholarship

The 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run Grant supported 32 local first generation youth and their families as they applied, enrolled, persisted, and worked towards college graduation during the 2022-2023 academic year. This summer, First in Family celebrated 2 more college graduates, 12 scholars starting college, and 10 rising high school seniors who joined the program. First in Family also partners with other local organizations and schools to encourage greater college enrollment and success for all local students with no family history of higher education.

Fund for Public Education

Thanks to the Community Foundation and the generous donors of Old Bill's, the Fund for Public Education was able to provide essential support to all 10 Teton County public schools, nearly 3,000 students, and more than 500 staff members again this year. Thanks to Old Bill's and our community supporters we provided access to free dental care and screenings for more than 1,500 elementary students, free daily meals to more than 600 kids in need, college scholarship opportunities to 132 graduating seniors, housing for teachers, free mental health care for kids, early intervention literacy training, free childcare for teen parents, and so much more. This funding allows our public schools to provide extraordinary opportunities for all students. Thank you for helping to make great things possible for our kids, our schools, and our community!

Geologists of Jackson Hole

Work in local schools to support teachers and provide education about the physical world around us. Bring speakers from regional universities and other organizations to speak twice per month about research related to our physical world, from the center of the earth to the literal end of the universe. Fund Jackson Hole High School graduate's college scholarships for earth science related majors.

Girl Scouts of Teton County

For the 2022-2023 school year, we started a new troop of K and 1st grade girls and gave them start-up funds, partnered with Shop with A Cop and the Wind River Community Alliance to give holiday gift bags to kids in need, paid rent for our Girl Scout Room, and hosted some fun events for local Girl Scouts.

Girls Actively Participating! GAP!

GAP! served over 150 girls in our community with confidence building after school programming in local elementary and middle schools. Our participants are 30% Latina and 70% Anglo, and about 25% of our participants are on financial scholarships. Studies show that girls confidence drops by 30% when girls hit middle school, and GAP! aims to overcome that statistic by providing engaging, relevant program sessions that help girls build self-esteem, resilience, positive body image, assertive communication, peer connection, become brave over perfect and step into their best selves with grace and grit.

Grand Teton Association

GTA used its funds to continue to support the Snake River Fund through the Bridger-Teton National Forest through education for the public on how to recreate responsibly through printing publications and general information.



High Mountain Pollinators and Bees

High Mountain Pollinators and Bees, with the sponsorship of Wyoming Wetlands Society, has been able to establish a relationship and educational outreach program partnering with the Teton Raptor Center. We participated in the Womomentum event during Women's history month to bring awareness of the importance of beekeeping and the women who pioneered this hobby. We are conducting educational events not only at Teton Raptor Center, but also at the elementary schools in Teton county. Teton Science School has partnered with us to paint the hives that are located at the Raptor Center. We conducted a Pollinator Plant Sale this spring to bring native plants to Teton County gardens, partnering with Piney Island Native Plants -- a nonprofit organization in Sheridan. It is very hard to estimate the specific number of people that we have served throughout Teton County. We hope to be able to continue this valuable program to educate those who are interested in the amazing life of the honey bee, how they work together in our ecosystem to provide us with healthy food, and to be able to promote pollinator habitat throughout the region. Thank you for allowing us to be part of this fundraising effort.

Jackson Hole Child Care Helpers

We granted funds to local licensed preschool and childcares, serving more than 250 local families. We added two new participating childcares to our program last year. Grants supported new educational curriculum, classroom/outdoor materials and equipment, hands-on learning tools, professional development, and expert instructor led classes (e.g. music and cross country skiing lessons). These grants enable childcare providers to maintain high-quality programming and improve the educational experiences for early childhood learners.

Jackson Hole Children's Museum

Our STEAM, Afterschool, Summer Camp, and Friday CREST programs have provided educational programs, out-of-school childcare, and social-emotional development opportunities to over 1300 children in the last 12 months, a critical service to our community. This year, in partnership with Teton Literacy Center, our afterschool reached over 200 students along with the addition two days of afterschool led at the Teton County Library with the goal of ensuring more working families have access to critical education services between the 3pm - 5pm time slot when parents are still working. The museum space has also served as a safe, playful, and creative space for families to spend quality time together outside of the home, another critical but limited resource in our community. Despite our current transition into our new space 105 Mercill Ave, we continue to prioritize supporting parents, families, and children in this community through our hands-on exhibits and public programming at our pop-up space at JH Indoor.

Jackson Hole Classical Academy

Old Bill's Funds are directed toward the tuition assistance program at the Academy. This program enables us to provide significant need-based tuition discounts to lower-income families. In the 2022-23 school year, approximately 40% of our students received some level of tuition discount. This program helps the Academy have a more socio-economically diverse student body and provides an enriching, high-quality educational opportunity to all families with whom the mission of the Academy resonates.

Jackson Hole Community School

We give financial aid to 30% of our students and this helps us be able to provide quality educations for students.

Jackson Hole Driving Foundation

The Jackson Hole Driving Foundation program offers scholarship for students in need and offers a driving program for young students to learn the rules and signs to become safer drivers in our community.

Jackson Hole Kayak Club

The impact Old Bill's has had on our organizations is to hire and pay staff more. Acquire new permits, obtain new assets, pay for staff certifications, and maintain equipment. Also bolster programs of inclusivity we use to partner with the Coombs foundation and scholarships that provide low cost to no cost opportunities for those unable to afford our services.



Jackson Hole Shooting Sports Foundation

With the help of Old Bill's the Jackson Hole Shooting Sports Foundation was able to continue critical safety infrastructure. These funds also support operational costs, shotgun bay shelter and upkeep and helped to procure target sets. These facilities and targets are used by countless members of the community accounting for approx. 2,900 user days.

Jackson Hole Ski Patrol Memorial Scholarship Fund

Old Bill's Fun Run grant allowed our fund to award college scholarships to a diverse group of eleven local students whose desire for higher education was resolute and purposeful. Their resilience in the challenging Covid years during high school was impressive. We feel honored to help them reach their dreams and goals with financial assistance.

Levi Dowell Memorial Scholarship

The scholarship provided needed financial support to scholarship to a graduating senior.

Moose Corner Children's Academy

Grand Teton's youngest explorers are building a knowledge and understanding of the world around them. These children are using innovation, construction, art, music, dance, building, writing, science, body, and soul to make their own theories to explain how their world works.

MusicLand

Monies from Old Bill's allowed MusicLand to continue to match and offer scholarships to over 20 families participating in our Youth Orchestra program, private study, and Music Together. Without this support these children could not share their passion for playing their instrument or benefit from music being instrumental in language development.

Native American Jump Start

Old Bill's Giving Season serves as Native American Jump Start's most significant annual fundraising event, yielding substantial outcomes. Last year, NAJS received a sum of nearly \$44,000. As a result, we continue to co-host the 3rd Annual Teton Powwow and Native American Dance Showcase, following the success of previous editions in 2022. This event encapsulates various essential objectives. Foremost, it strives to foster diversity and inclusivity within the Jackson community and local neighboring tribes. The Powwow and Showcase not only enrich Jackson by showcasing its historical heritage and promoting cultural awareness, but also by breaking down barriers and forging connections between disparate communities. By organizing this grand-scale cultural weekend, we endeavor to enhance brand recognition and cultivate a supportive donor base, thereby securing the future of our noble cause. Additionally, we continue to support our core native scholarship programs at Grand Teton National Park and The National Museum of Wildlife Art.

P.E.O. Chapter BG

Following a generous contribution to our PEO scholarship fund, PEO Chapter BG continues to award numerous scholarships to a diversified and talented group of women in our area. We strive to remain in contact with our applicants.

Rocky Mountain Ministries

From this grant we provided 11 scholarships and hosted approximately 280 guests. Our organization also provides housing for our year-round employees as well as our summer program volunteers which is a huge need in Teton County. Thank you to Mr. & Mrs. Old Bill and Community Foundation for allowing us to be part of this wonderful program for the non-profits in Teton County!

Rotary Breakfast Club of Jackson Hole

Old Bill's funds allowed us to support the Central Wyoming College Bridge to College and Career Program, which supports and nurtures students in the gap between high school and college or college and their career.



Scout BSA Troop 67

Prior years funds were used 100% to give scouts an outdoor experience of cooking, camping and 100-mile river trip. We teach skills they can use for a lifetime! Our troop hosts dinners at the Mission and at breakfast at our meeting place and Sponsor First Baptist Church for the community to attend.

Snow King Volunteer Ski Patrol

Through the donations and matching funds from last year's grant, we have been able to hold and provide quality training programs, purchase and update training equipment, and support our instructor's continuing education.

Soroptimist International of Jackson Hole

Funds received through Old Bill's help Soroptimist International of Jackson directly impact the lives of women and children in Teton County. With 2022 donations, Soroptimist provided direct support for a local woman, and her children, in crisis, alleviate financial barriers to higher education for four local high school students through scholarships, and on programs that enrich the lives of women and girls including providing travel assistance for educational opportunities for local youth organizations, supporting program expansion for two local youth organizations and one local women's organization, and provided funding for access to feminine hygiene products for local women and girls to help prevent missing school. Funds received through Old Bill's also allow Soroptimist to utilize other fundraising dollars to support additional organizations that support women and children in Teton County.

Targhee Music Camp

Due to the ongoing pandemic, the Targhee Music Camp has been on hiatus for three years. We look forward to August 2023 for our next camp and Old Bill's financial support the last three years has helped us continue to run and plan for the next camp, our 15th (used to be annual) Targhee Music Camp.

Ted Jonke Memorial Soccer Scholarship

Scholarships were awarded to Teton County students based on academic merit and community involvement and participation in soccer.

Teton Botanical Garden

Our use of Old Bill's Funds impacted over 100 students in Teton County Schools through our school garden projects. Funds for the National Museum of Wildlife Art project helped reach hundreds of visitors to the Museum from all over the country and created educational materials on fire ecology. Other funds were used at Sage Living Center and the Community Counseling Center to benefit residents and guests through beautification and client activities. We continue to expand our outreach through education and new and ongoing projects.

Teton County 4-H

These funds supported fair awards for youth members and educational travel opportunities for local 4-H members. They also supported meaningful ongoing local programs like shooting sports, dog club, other animal projects, and others.

Teton Literacy Center

Funds were used to provide tutoring, enrichment and family literacy services to children and families in Teton County. All programs took place in Teton County. Funds provided direct services to children (preschool- high school age) and their families, supported staff salaries, purchased instructional materials, funded lesson planning and curriculum development time and supported professional development. Programs provided include: afterschool clubs K-8th grade, afterschool tutoring, volunteer training and workshops, preschool classes, family literacy events, parent workshops and classes, and home visits. TLC provides integrated family-centered programs that combine tutoring, enrichment, and family literacy services to children and parents. TLC is unique in providing these free resources, giving families the opportunity to increase their literacy in a safe, family-friendly environment. TLC served 449 students last year through tutoring, after school clubs and workshops, summer camps, literacy small groups, preschool classes, parent programs, and family literacy activities. Over the past 5



years we have served 2,750 students. TLC provided over 27,000 hours of free literacy support during the past year. Over 2,500 books were given to children and families to build at home libraries. We had 89 volunteers working with us and 100% of those volunteers surveyed expressed that they felt successful in improving their student's literacy skills and wish to continue tutoring.

Teton Science Schools

At Teton Science Schools, students experience place to understand the world and change the world for the better. This occurs through in-person, hands-on, project-based, and place-based learning. With the support from community members through Old Bill's Fun Run TSS has been able to continue offering transformative learning experiences for local community members and for learners from all over the world.

Teton Valley Ranch Camp

Old Bill's funding helps TVRC to partner with local businesses, support scholarships for local kids, and work with local organizations to expand access to the outdoors. The funds raised in last year's Old Bill's Fun Run supported TVRC's continued work in Teton County by funding key parts of our backcountry programming and other necessary services provided by community businesses and further enabling us to support scholarships for Teton County kids. This year to date we've extended \$9,100 in scholarships to Teton County campers.

The Billy Frank Memorial Scholarship

We awarded 11 scholarships to graduating high school seniors in 2022. These students who attend an out-of-state college, university, or vocational school will receive \$1,000 their freshman year and \$1,000 their sophomore year of school to help with expenses. We selected these students based on their responses to the essay questions in the scholarship application. They showed a high level of maturity, an ambition to be a productive member of society, and a sincere compassion for the lives of other people.

Transcendental Meditation Center of Jackson Hole

The funds raised through Old Bill's have enabled us to offer Transcendental Meditation at a reduced rate to dozens of local individuals with financial need, to offer remote enrichment, and to maintain the necessary facilities to provide our services.

Womentum

Old Bill's Fun Run grant money provides the funds necessary to keep our organization vibrant and able to serve our community with personal and professional development opportunities for women. Womentum's move in 2022 to a salaried Executive Director and a part time Director of Communications changed the trajectory of our offerings. This past year was our most successful to date! We offered over 22 public programs, including our annual Leadership Summit, serving in sum over 1200 participants. Our signature 9-month mentoring program boasted its largest cohort including eight women to whom English is a second language. The growth and success of Womentum this past year has proved that women in Jackson Hole are craving networking opportunities, building community, and growth opportunities. As we support these women, they improve the organizations and businesses they serve.

Wonder Institute (Center of Wonder)

Old Bill's funds allowed us to provide much needed programming, creative education, mentorship, and a vibrant space for our youth. Wonder Institute continues to expand its community-based programming. In addition to its Maker Space, digital media lab and Robotics Lab, Wonder Institute is collaborating to offer our community a recording studio and media editing station. In partnership with TCSD, over 500 students participated in a robotics program. Other programs include digital media, the We the People civic education program, and the national Stock Market game.

Wyoming Stargazing

Using 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run grant funds, Wyoming Stargazing offered 136 public astronomy programs to 2,359 adults and 1,521 students. These programs included public stargazing programs offered in English to the general



public and in Spanish to members of Camina Conmigo. We also facilitated public solar astronomy programs at the People's Market and in-class astronomy presentations for TCSD.

Young Eagles Flight Training Scholarship

We have provided local high school students the opportunity to achieve their dream of becoming a Private Pilot

Health & Human Services

Becoming Jackson Whole

With funds raised during Old Bill's 2022, Becoming Jackson Whole partnered with instructor Brad Marshall to offer our eight-hour Power of Awareness training for 70 registered first responders, health and human service providers, and nonprofit leaders. We continued to expand our community outreach with readily accessible tools that address mental wellness, distributing Daily Acts emails seven days a week to 3,000 members of the community. Our annual 21-Day Challenge attracted nearly 1,100 participants who logged over 1,800,000 minutes of practice during the three-week program. We continued our partnership with the Jackson Police Department, providing coaching support as they continued to integrate practices into their daily routines.

Brain Chemistry Labs

A major initiative at the Brain Chemistry Labs is to find a cause for neurodegenerative diseases. With the grant support from Old Bill's Fun Run 2022, the Brain Chemistry Labs was able to use funds that would have been used to pay for rent and lab maintenance, and instead provide additional lab supplies needed to perform the scientific research which we hope will lead to the discovery of the cause and possible treatment of Alzheimer's, ALS, and Parkinson's disease.

Children's Grand Adventure

We continue to be moved beyond words by the impact that Old Bill's continues to breathe into the depth of healing, and expansion of accessibility for those whom we serve. With both our in-person and virtual program offerings, working hand in hand with local organizations, partners, businesses, volunteers and supporters within our Jackson community, the impact upon those we serve is perpetually profound. Because of Old Bill's we are able to continue to serve 100's of patients, and growing, exponentially, including patients and survivors locally, both through the in-person, along with the rapid outreach capacity and development of our scope of reach. Old Bill's allows us to connect all to the power of this incredible place, without accessibility or immunity boundaries.

Climb Wyoming

With support from Old Bill's Fun Run, Teton Climb successfully served:

- 11 candidates with 22 children through pre-program stabilization efforts, connecting moms to critical resources, such as food, shelter, and healthcare;
- 19 moms with 40 children through intensive industry training and placement, life and financial skills development, and mental health support;
- And 40 graduates with 95 children through post-program services including networking and support meetings for success long-term with family and career.

A highlight was our Commercial Driver's License (CDL) training. This intensive program included 8 weeks of lessons, several written tests, Pre-trip Inspection Test, Backing Test, and Driving test. All participants passed and received their "Class A" CDL. Wages for placements were between \$24-\$28/hour, plus overtime. Evans Construction hired 3 of our graduates, who are now driving a variety of trucks on job sites, including road repairs in Yellowstone after the serious flooding this Spring.

Community Bible Church

In impact of Old Bill's 2022 continues to be a blessing to CBC. It continues to give us the extra funds to help those who are in need in our community. We continue to help over 20 families and individuals with the rising costs of food, gas, housing, and medical needs.



Community Entry Services

Funds awarded were utilized to help us maintain our wage increase for direct support staff. CES reduced its staff vacancy rate from 62% to 25%. Reducing staff vacancies resulted in secure housing supports, adequate job supports, and continued community access for clients with intellectual/developmental disabilities. Staffing ensures CES' ability to coordinate services with other organizations such as Therapeutic Riding and Special Olympics, resulting in better and more comprehensive services for all. Coordination of care ensures CES remains mission-driven and positive physical, mental, and emotional health outcomes for clients. Additionally, CES was able to renovate a bathroom in one residence, addressing health and safety concerns and creating a second accessible bathroom as client population ages. Maintaining our centrally located office space through rising costs in Jackson is vital as it is the hub of activity and where our 34 clients socialize, interact and access supports.

Community Housing Trust

Unprecedented support through Old Bill's Fun Run in 2022 allowed the Community Housing Trust to continue to invest in the capacity of the organization and ensure that we have the professional resources necessary to advance strategic opportunities for partnership and sustain the increased momentum of the organization. Specifically, the generosity donated through Old Bill's Fun Run will help support work on three projects and 80 units in the pipeline -- both affordable rental and ownership -- over the next three years. These funds also helped to advance the necessary work for Northern South Park, which if this project is moved forward creates an opportunity to develop 420 truly affordable homes.

Community Safety Network

Funds raised during Old Bill's ensured that CSN could serve 176 clients experiencing domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, including 152 adults and 24 children. Between October 2022 and May 15, 2023, 66 guests used emergency shelter services for a total of 987 bed nights. CSN responded to 139 hotline calls and offered a total of 1132 support services to clients, including safety planning, emotional support, and assistance with navigating the criminal justice system. Old Bill's funds also supported CSN's programs for middle and high school students that focus on healthy relationships and consent. This includes health classes and peer-led clubs at the middle and high school, as well as the Athletes as Leaders and Coaching Boys into Men. A total of 500 students are directly engaged in these programs, with hundreds more indirectly engaged through student outreach activities.

Compass Women's Care formerly Turning Point Pregnancy Resource Center

All of our services are free and confidential, and offered in English and Spanish. In 2022, we had 165 client visits with over 100 clients who received pregnancy testing, ultrasounds, and pregnancy options. Clients participated in 394 individual classes and 30 group classes. The clients received necessary baby items for their participation. Around 75 referrals were made to other community resource services.

Environmental Health Trust

With the support of the Jackson Hole Community Foundation, EHT reached more than 15,000 people in Teton County in 2022 through its distribution of materials and live educational events on the potential health risks of environmental exposures. EHT hosted or participated in three major educational events in Teton County: an expert symposium with medical professionals on "Avoidable Environmental Health Risks for Children and their Families;" a program on "The Science of Sleeping in the Dark: Proven Formulas for Better Sleep," co-hosted with Wyoming Stargazing; and a booth at the annual Eco Fair. EHT has worked with many local health professionals & businesses to share information on protective measures for their communities. EHT reached 60,000 people in Teton County through its public service announcements (PSAs) at local movie theaters and 17,000+ people through advertising in the Jackson Hole News & Guide's Hole Health special issue.

First Baptist Church

100% of our Old Bill's funds go directly into our Benevolence account. This account is used solely to meet the needs of families / individuals with emergency housing, food, medical, transportation, and other financial needs. We



desire to honor the integrity and intention of Old Bill's Fun Run in distributing these funds. We are grateful for the opportunity to participate in the community event that enables us to help those in need in a greater way.

Friends of the Jackson Mounted Patrol

The volunteers of the Citizens Mounted Unit, funded by the Friends of the Jackson Mounted Patrol, impacted the community in five ways this past year:

- 1) We gave a western feeling to the Town Square when on duty (tourists love us!)
- 2) We aided the Jackson Police Dept by being an extra set of eyes and ears on or near the town square plus the Teton County Fairgrounds during Fair Week.
- 3) We assisted in traffic-control for the Old West Days parade and July 4th parade, plus other community events requesting our services such as live concerts.
- 4) The Police Department's mission statement includes the phrase "Western Heritage, Community Pride." Our unit exemplifies this statement by keeping the Western Heritage alive by patrolling throughout the summer downtown from horseback.
- 5) We assisted with the Elk Antler Shed hunters that lined up in early May.

Old Bill's allows our unit to purchase uniforms, equipment and training necessary to "Ride For The Brand" - our beloved Jackson Hole.

Good Samaritan Mission

Allowed us to feed and house people in need. Provide funds for much-needed repairs to keep our building operational and safe.

Habitat for Humanity of the Greater Teton Area

The funds from Old Bill's Fun Run 2022 were critical in supporting Habitat's operations as we kicked off a new, 18-unit housing development: Parkside at Benson-Brown station. With funding from Old Bill's 2022, we were able to ramp up volunteer activities on the construction site, launch partnerships with 6 future Habitat homeowners, and offer opportunities for staff development in order to enhance our internal capacity to confront the ever-worsening housing crisis in our community.

Hearts for the Hungry Community Lunch- Our Lady of the Mountains

We serve the disadvantaged and poverty-stricken in our community. We provided over 4,500 meals in 2022-2023. Although our numbers are not sizeable there is a regular group who depend on us for their daily meal. In the high season, we welcome transients and those new to the community. We actively work to bring hope and stability to the life of our guests. Hearts for the Hungry is serving according to situational needs, not just by a meal. Our goal is to feed bellies and warm hearts while restoring a sense of freedom to the individual. With out the help of the Community foundation this program would not be available to all these people. Our cook Isabel does a fantastic job of putting not only a hot meal in their hands but also providing a friendly familiar face that people can count on. She provides such delicious and nutritious meals that all participants when asked absolutely love our lunch program! Thank you Old Bill's, without your support we could not continue doing our work to our community! THANK YOU!

Hole Food Rescue

Funding from Old Bill's 2022, allowed Hole Food Rescue (HFR) to expand its reach and impact in the community. In 2022, HFR rescued 336,206 pounds of food from entering the landfill and distributed it to community members in Jackson. This reflects an 18% increase in food rescued from 2021. Food for the Community // Comida de la Comunidad programs logged 1000 individual monthly visits on average, a 27% increase from 2021. The funding also had a huge impact on our children's programs; a 24% increase in lunches distributed to children through the Sprout Summer Lunch program; and a 30% increase in the number of families enrolled in the Weekend Food Bag (WFB) program. Last year, we had 87 children enrolled in WFB, and currently, we have 122 families signed up to receive snacks, groceries, and easy-to-make meals every weekend of the school year.



Honoring Our Veterans

The funds we receive from Old Bill's Fun Run help us bring combat wounded Veterans to Jackson for week-long recreational rehabilitation therapy sessions. By maximizing the healing potential of nature, we assist Veterans as they move forward along their path to recovery by providing them with activities that increase confidence, improve both fine and gross motor skills, improve concentration, build trust, and help with the process of reintegrating into society.

Horse Warriors

The funds from Old Bill's Fun Run are our biggest source of operating support. Without them we would not be able to provide the programs that help kids and families grow together in healthy ways. Last year we increased our services to Latino families, as well as increasing the number of students on the autism spectrum. We added more of our teens to the in-house mentoring program, where they instruct the younger children and help them teach their parents. Those interactions help all parties practice clear communication and listening, and create a framework for relationships outside of Horse Warriors. We added more 2nd generation students (children of former HW students) and expanded our free Cancer Kickers program to reach out to oncology nurses and hospital staff who are caregivers, as well as to new cancer survivors. Our program was highlighted in the PATH, International STRIDES publication for our work with mustangs and their abilities to bond and create healthy relationships with our students. Our Executive Director, Priscilla Marden, CEIP-ED, CTRI, ESMHL, co-presented a seminar program on Art and Mental Health with Dr. Terry Chase, ND, MA, RN, CEIP-ED, through the Wyoming Arts Council. The popular Professionals' Training, held in June, expanded its coverage of Somatic Experiencing, bringing horses into the process of trauma informed therapy for healing clients. Our mentor team of teens helping teach younger students increased as well, and provided a broad arrange of skill sets to our participating families.

Immigrant Hope

In 2022, Immigrant Hope provided application assistance for 56 applicants and provided 49 consultations for forms of immigration relief, for a total of 105 people helped. The largest number of those applications were DACA Renewals and Green Card applications. By providing a legal pathway to citizenship for one person, the whole family benefits as does Jackson. Each individual who is able to attain legal status is another person who can legally work, drive, pay taxes, and participate more fully in the community. It also provides a huge measure of stability to affected families. No longer is the family fearful of what will happen to them.

Jackson Hole Farmers Market on the Town Square

The Old Bill's Fun Run helps the Jackson Hole Farmers Market keep the farmers coming back to the market with our Farm to Market grants and it also helps us to stay up and running on the Town Square. Providing the space for farmers and food vendors to operate their business is such a huge win for our community. Having these funds keeps us operating so we can provide the community with local fresh food and a community event that everyone can enjoy.

Jackson Hole Fire/EMS Foundation (Stations 1,2,3,4,6,7, and Teton Village)

Old Bill's Fun Run has always had an immense impact on Fire/EMS as the donations received from Old Bill's have a direct impact on approximately 80 volunteer Fire/EMS members across Teton Co. WY. With these funds we advance our education, recruitment, and retention, and we are able to work in a safe manner due to the purchase of new personal protective gear. This training, education, and equipment allows us to respond quickly and safely to all emergencies in Teton County. This last year however, the support allowed us to combine all Associations under one banner and have a unified support across the county, creating opportunities to better identify areas of improvement for training and support of Fire/EMS personnel.

Jackson Hole Search Dogs

Jackson Hole Search Dog teams deployed on a variety of missions last year in Wyoming and surrounding states including Idaho, Utah, and Washington. To assist in the recovery of loved ones and closure provided to family and friends is a profound opportunity for our teams. Teams train year-round in and around the town of Jackson,



public lands provide important opportunities; often teams use the streets of town for tracking purposes in the winter, maintaining our skills for the busy spring summer and fall seasons.

Jackson Hole Therapeutic Riding

Year after year, Old Bill's allows Jackson Hole Therapeutic Riding to empower, inspire, and enrich the lives of hundreds. Funds help to sustain impactful programs, develop innovative services, advance instructor proficiency, maintain healthy, happy horses, and positively change lives.

Kiwanis of Jackson Hole

Kiwanis takes our responsibilities to the community very seriously. We annually award scholarships to Jackson High School graduating seniors who are members of the Key Club and who have demonstrated outstanding volunteer work for the citizens of Jackson. We have extended this idea of scholarships to fund summer program memberships for children here in the Valley through The Avery Matthieu scholarship at the Art Association of Jackson Hole, and Doug Coombs Foundation. We give scholarships to GAP and other non-profits that run summer programs. We usually spend the entire amount that we get from Old Bill's each year on these types of scholarships, plus purchasing child car seats as needed, through Public Health, and the Fire department. We regularly purchase several cases of diapers for the Cupboard to distribute and this year we purchased jackets, boots, lunchboxes, and mittens for children at Munger Mountain School. An estimate the number of children served - 50-100 through the various scholarships, 100 at MM School, 40 car seats, and the parents whose children are provided diapers. There are many under-served children in Jackson Hole, and our Kiwanis Club strives to meet their needs.

Lions Club of Jackson Hole

Between Oct. 2022 and May 2023, the Jackson Hole Lions Club assisted more than 2,100 Teton County (Public & Private) school students with eye and hearing screening. The school nurse issued 30 vouchers verified for financial need, and One22 issued 7 adult vouchers to be used for eye care prevention or eyesight restoration. Our Partner, One22, provides safe, secure, confidential financial evaluations and assessments of need. The Doctor-provider is reimbursed for partial fees by the Lions Club of Jackson Hole. The Lions Club of Jackson Hole continues to provide annual maintenance of the eye and hearing screening equipment donated to the public and private schools. A small amount of the funds was used to send recycled eyeglasses, collected from 12 locations in Jackson and Wilson to the Rawlins Correction Center for cleaning, prescription determination, and packaging for distribution outside of the U.S. in a partnership with Doctors without Borders. We also assisted one adult in Lincoln Co with special eye surgery in coordination with Lions Club International. The person was without medical insurance and was losing eyesight. NOTE: At the time of this application, the school year is not yet completed, and we typically incur a surge of students prior to the close of the school year, as students seek summer jobs. As in past years, we expect to spend more on eye care than what we received in CFJH-OBFR donations and match. Additional funding needs are met with Lions Club fund raisers such as the Flag Program, July 4th Street Breakfast, and the Teton County Fair Breakfasts.

Mental Health & Recovery Services of Jackson Hole (formerly JH Community Counseling & Curran Seeley)

Old Bill's funds have supported efforts with our organization through a merger (Jackson Hole Community Counseling and Curran Seeley) to continue to provide safety net services for those experiencing mental illness or substance use issues. We are working toward best practice, integrated services and have continued to provide services and supports for 2,500 individuals - regardless of ability to pay. The support of our community allows for individuals to ALWAYS have someone to talk to, whether that is in person or on the phone, 24 hours per day, 7 days a week and every day of the year.

One22 Resource Center

The funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run each year support One22 Resource Center's mission to invest in and support our neighbors who face financial and cultural challenges. Last year, our team served 1,265 households, representing 2,557 individual members of our community. One22 provided more than \$1.3 million in support to



local households with rent, no-cost groceries, childcare, and other critical needs. Through the Jackson Cupboard, our food access program distributed 357,327 pounds of food in 6,463 shopping visits. Funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run bolstered our program development efforts, and provided critical funding for our operations, including personnel expenses, professional services, and technical support. As we hone our program focus and outcomes this year, this support has been critical in our ability to be responsive, efficient, and trauma-informed in a challenging environment.

People Spread Love

With the help of Old Bill's Fun Run grant money, we were able to impact our community through volunteer recruitment and retention. Since Old Bill's Fun in 2022, People Spread Love has recruited over 30 people and 12 organizations in the valley. We have also built brand awareness with marketing efforts, public events, and community involvement. We have hosted/cohosted over 12 public events in the past year that helped ignite more curiosity about spreading love and compassion to community members in the valley and across the country. This adaptable and accessible volunteer work makes this impact diverse and palatable for everyone involved. With the help of Old Bill's Fun Run grant funding, PSL can invest more in marketing and storytelling to share our impact and recruit more interest.

Pioneer Homestead Apartments

Our mission is to provide safe and affordable housing for our residents who are low income senior and handicapped individuals. Insulating the roof enables us to better manage heating costs and also reduce energy consumption.

Presbyterian Church of Jackson Hole

Presbyterian Church of Jackson Hole uses these funds to help the needy in our community and to provide non-religious programs for children, youth, and families. We provide safe preschool breakfast clubs for middle and high school students as well as after-school programs. Little Lambs Daycare is a real service for working mothers. Our Music Academy is active. Our Wednesday community dinners are open to all. Our Big 5 drive provides winter clothing items to children in the community.

Senior Center of Jackson Hole

Our WyHS and WSSB grants are expended as of 4/30/2023. Old Bill's will fund the remaining 3 months for these programs. Our Congregate and Meals On Wheels programs will expend June 2023. Old Bill's will fund the remaining months for these programs.

Shepherd of the Mountains Lutheran Church

With Old Bill's Fun Run money Shepherd of the Mountains paid rent for a person who had an accident and couldn't work. We helped a member of Teton County house 9 refugees. We issued Smith's gift cards to 3 people in need of food and gas. We helped a single mother with a gift card to help with expenses.

Special Olympics Wyoming

Over 200 Teton County athletes, partners, coaches, and volunteers are actively registered with Special Olympics Wyoming. High caliber Teton County volunteers help to provide a quality experience for our athletes, promote physical activity, physical fitness, and in turn promote inclusion and acceptance in the community.

St. John's Episcopal Church Jackson Hole

Thanks to the generosity of Old Bill's in 2022, St. John's Episcopal Church was able to spread love into the community of Jackson Hole in a myriad of ways. We supported community involvement in the arts by hosting two writing camps in the summer and year-round book clubs for children. We brought joy to children and adults alike with our Ice Cream Bike, giving away free ice cream treats throughout the summer and during the community 4th of July parade. We sponsored several children in local summer camps and school programs. We bought and distributed Christmas gifts and grocery coupons for elderly community members. Old Bill's donations helped us support transportation for medical needs, food, gas, laundry, coats, period supplies, utility costs and other critical



care needs. We used some of the funds we received to help defray our costs of providing the use of our facilities for community nonprofits. Thank you, Old Bill's, for helping us help Jackson Hole.

St. John's Health Foundation

It takes an exceptional community hospital to support an extraordinary community. And it takes an extraordinary community to support an exceptional community hospital. Our role at the Foundation is to reinforce that relationship by raising funds for programs that enhance and advance our hospital's services, capabilities, and capacities. St. John's Health serves more than 20,000 community members and is here for 2.5 million visitors each year. This year all unrestricted gifts were put toward St. John's Health's most important needs.

Stripping for a Cure

We are so grateful for the support of our generous community. Stripping for a Cure was able to support the Cancer Patient Support Fund and the Cancer Survivorship Program at St. John's Health at the highest level to date because of Old Bill's and our incredibly giving community. As the lead donor to both of these Funds, SFAC is proud to be assisting all our local cancer patients both financially and holistically.

Teton Adaptive

Money from Old Bill's directly supported Teton Adaptive's ability to run a successful operation and support a variety of programs. Last year's grant funded vehicle expenses that were crucial in our ability to transport equipment to different locations. In addition, funding supported our fixed costs of rent and staff salaries. This allowed our staff to focus efforts on programming, training, and equipment that go directly to participants. Consistent support from Old Bill's allows us to budget and plan our annual operations and staffing effectively to best support people with disabilities in Teton County!

Teton County Pet Partners

Teton County Pet Partners puts smiles on senior's faces, eases hospital patients' pain and helps kids read. With the funding we received last year, we focused on rebuilding the number of local therapy teams, jumping our numbers up from 22 animal therapy teams to 36. We hosted six in-person team evaluations, which gave us the opportunity to evaluate 36 teams. The demand for our services has risen greatly since COVID 19, and we met the need by adding nine new organizations to the list we serve, bringing our total up to 20 local organizations.

Teton County Search and Rescue Foundation

In 2022, TCSAR responded to 136 calls for service, making it the busiest rescue year ever. In all, TCSAR volunteers spent 5,549 hours on rescues, 5,494 hours training, and 540 hours at community events. The team and foundation also navigated a 7.25 million dollar capital campaign to purchase a year-round SAR dedicated helicopter. TCSAR Foundation educated over 600 people through the Wyoming Snow and Avalanche workshop, 1,200 people through programming and outreach of Backcountry Zero, and thousands more through the Fine Line Podcast. Old Bill's funding and the Teton County Search and Rescue Foundation supports volunteers who serve our community by saving lives and teaching best practices in the backcountry.

Teton County Sexual & Reproductive Health Services

Teton County Sexual & Reproductive Health Services has provided over 1,750 appointments from September 2022 to the present. We continued to serve clients with complex issues involving domestic violence, drug abuse, sexual assault, and mental health issues. Our Sexual & Reproductive Health Services staff includes seven full time and one part time positions including four nurses, a sexual health educator, an interpreter, and two administrative personnel. St John's Health continues to support our 8-hour clinic. We expanded our use of donor funds received to include salaries for two nurse practitioners for a 4-hour afternoon/evening clinic and a second 8-hour clinic. The point-of-care ultrasound bought in 2022, is used to improve IUD Insertion/removal efficiency, safety, and accuracy. Funds purchase birth control including long-acting reversible contraceptives (IUDs and Implants).

Teton County Victim Services

Old Bill's Fun Run funds allowed Victim Services to assist victims through a Domestic violence trial. Funds were



used to assist survivors and friends of suicide victims. Funds were used to assist in training three new volunteers and one prior volunteer. Funds allowed advocates to attend Spanish training in person and online- this resulted in increased Spanish fluency and better immediate assistance to victims of crime and continues to assist our local Spanish speaking clients. Old Bill's Funds allowed advocates to attend National training to learn current techniques and resources to better assist victims of crime. Numerous victims of stalking, sexual assault, and domestic violence were provided with MACE to provide security. Four victims were provided with emergency assistance funds to allow for the purchase of gas and food- this facilitated two separate families to take their child to Idaho for pediatric sexual assault exams.

Teton Free Clinic

The Teton Free Clinic believes that everyone has the right to receive medical care regardless of their ability to pay. We understand the challenge faced by those who work in a seasonal community where most are not provided health insurance, creating a barrier to accessing medical care. The clinic is open 2 days a week and provides services to more than 1,100 visits annually. One of our goals is to keep non-emergent patients out of the emergency department. We provide all patients with free consultations, education, medications, lab and diagnostic studies as well as supplies and support groups for the management of many chronic diseases and illnesses.

Teton Parkies. A Parkinson's Disease Support Group

Funds from Old Bill's support our mission of helping those who have Parkinson's Disease and their significant others. We have educational meetings with physicians and Allied Health Professionals, a holiday dinner where 38 people attended to socialize and make new acquaintances. We support families during the loss of their loved ones, support those who are unable to afford PD exercise classes and meals when we all go out. Our current roster has 55 members. We supply connections to our Teton Parkies with health care and other services. We assess the needs of members, engage them in activities and opportunities offered by the Parkies, facilitate helpful connections to community services for new members.

Teton Youth and Family Services

Our services saw a 40% increase in need in 2021 and an additional rise of 30% in 2022. The impact this has had includes:

- 9,805 safe bed nights for youth in our residential programs
- Services to over 800 children and family members
- 3,240 Hours of therapy sessions for 145 children and family members at the Hirschfield Center
- 85% of youth served in the residential programs do not go on to higher levels of care

Mentoring, empowerment, advocacy, therapy, asset building, suicide prevention, education, community service, relationship building, these efforts help children and families never reach the more intense levels of support our program offers.

The Riverbend Project

Although funds are unspent, we will be using the funds from last year's Old Bill's Fun Run to help fund 2 retreats for cancer patients and survivors in August 2023 and September 2023. Funds will be used to help cancer patients and survivors experience fly fishing in the Jackson area, while providing them with a cost-free retreat (lodging, meals, additional expenses).

The Spread the Love Commission

Housing insecurity and the homeless crisis impact us all, nationally and locally. STLC uses the information and experience acquired through our regional and national outreach to inform and serve our own community. Much like Hole Food Rescue does with food, we start with Jackson Hole's high-quality, essential surplus to support our clients.

* We collect and sort high quality and client-specified, nonfood supplies from sponsors, businesses, other organizations and individuals in Teton County.

* We educate and involve our community regarding homelessness through volunteer activities and presentations



for kids and adults.

* Our care kits along with the other essential nonfood items go directly to our local workforce and our most vulnerable through our nonprofit partnerships.

* We've formed a Task Force along with the Jackson Police Department, other human services organizations and our clients to create a model to better serve our unhoused and displaced.

Watershed Jackson

We were able to continue our athlete study and purchase more mouthguards to expand our reach for both summer and winter seasonal volunteers. We went from 6 winter athletes and 4 summer athletes to 15 winter athletes and 10 summer athletes. We had the funds to help offset costs of our preseason baseline tests with youth sports programs this winter for 6 teams. Our program was also able to help fund a support group for those recovering from a TBI and Concussion. And we are supplementing training for local physicians and pt's to be able to expand their support and training for concussion diagnosis and recovery.

Wind River Community Alliance

The impact of programs and connections that Wind River Community Alliance has made goes beyond the over 100 workshop attendees since last Old Bill's, and the countless connections made between Teton County and the WRIR. Impact is seen in the bridge being built between Native and Non-Native community, and Teton County and the WRIR. Our work combats the most prevalent modern form of racism against Native Americans, invisibility. The majority of community members know little about Native Americans, and/or don't know any Native people, contributing to bias, discrimination, institutional racism, and erasure of an accurate narrative about Native Americans. We are a connected community. When we harm one, we harm all. When we celebrate and lift up one, we celebrate and lift up the whole. Through educational, cultural, and relational programming, and supporting relationships between organizations and people in Teton County and the WRIR, WRCA is strengthening our community.

Wyoming K-9 Search and Rescue, Inc

We are in the process of purchasing a boat, trailer and additional equipment needed for training and maintaining our teams in water searching. We can potentially use all unspent funds for both 2021 and 2022, and ear-marked them accordingly. Old Bill's money continues to be crucial in providing insurance for our animals, as well as equipment, training, and testing, in order to keep our teams in top mission ready form. We are here to serve our community as well as the numerous visitors each year.

Young Life Jackson Hole

Young Life Jackson Hole continued the well-received initiative of giving out goodie bags (ziploc bag with snacks and drink) to high school and middle school sports teams and clubs. Each bag had an inspirational quote and text number to anonymous teen hotline as a resource! Intended to be a pick-me-up during COVID and for teens to know they are not forgotten and there are people who care about them. We have passed out over 2,700 bags so far!

Sport/Recreation

Advocates for Multi-Use of Public Lands

Donations received through 2022 Old Bill's enabled AMPL to do a large amount of work on our public lands. We were able to install 10 beacon check stations around Teton County for winter backcountry users, and employ a part time trail crew who cleared and improved trails on the Bridger-Teton National Forest. This work would not have been possible without the generous funds we received from Old Bill's and the Community Challenge grant.

American Alpine Club - Grand Teton Climbers' Ranch

The Grand Teton Climbers' Ranch provides dormitory-style lodging at modest rates centrally located inside of Grand Teton National Park. Over the past 7 years, the GTCR provided an average of 4,426 bunk nights to guests per year. In 2021, the Ranch resumed operations following a historic closure in 2020 due to Covid-19. CFJH funding



was, and continues to be, critical in the Ranch's ability to maintain and preserve its historical structures, which date back to 1924. Since 1970, the GTCR has acted as an authorized concession to the NPS, serving climbers and outdoor enthusiasts visiting Grand Teton National Park from around the globe. We provide community programming to guests, such as our Speaker Series and free bicycles to reduce traffic inside the park. Under the guidance of the NPS, the GTCR is working hard to implement an accessibility plan that ensures the Ranch can be enjoyed by all park visitors.

Axis Booster Club

During the 2022 fiscal grant year AXIS gymnastics focused on community events, recreational session ending showcases and travel expenses for coaches to attend regional competitions. In addition, the Axis Booster Club supported athlete recognition. Funds raised from Old Bill's has helped the AXIS Booster Club provide:

- Onsite physical therapy for Axis athletes.
- Axis booster club sponsor community Halloween and Holiday haunted house - free to the community - between the two events we accommodated more than 400 kids and families.
- Funds were used pay for coaches to attend regional and national competitions. This helped to greatly offset expenses for families.
- End of the season recognition gifts for competitive athletes.

Carving the Future

We handed out over 25 complete skateboards to kids. We held 6 skate clinics as well. This has created a possibility for kids to get outside and enjoy their surroundings. We brought the Latina leadership group to JHMR and gave them snowboarding lessons.

Center Management Inc

Supported continued growth of Teton adaptive sports Sled hockey, supported general operations, continued to provide hourly ice rates for youth hockey programs.

Chris Hodges Memorial Scholarship Fund

We were able to give out 5 scholarships to deserving Teton County graduating seniors in the amount of \$3,000 each.

Coombs Outdoors

Funding through Old Bill's Fun Run supports Coombs Outdoors year-round outdoor recreation programs, which reduce barriers and create access to the outdoors for local youth ages 5 - 18. In 2022-2023, Coombs Outdoors enrolled more than 400 local youth in programs, providing experiences that build a sense of community and belonging, increase confidence and self-esteem. and improve mental, emotional, and physical health. Activate programs are designed to introduce elementary students to the outdoors with activities such as alpine and Nordic ski lessons, swimming lessons, afterschool programs, and outdoor adventure camps. Engage programs help middle schoolers dive deeper into recreation with mentor-led ski programs, afterschool workshops, spring break trips, climbing, kayaking, and mountain bike clubs, and summer hiking and backpacking camps. Empower programs provide continuity of services to high schoolers and include recreation opportunities, as well as an internship program in partnership with local businesses and professional and personal development workshops.

Cycling Without Age Jackson Hole

Again, due to COVID health restrictions, and other barriers (restricted volunteer pilots), CWA had limited ability in providing rides to Sage Living residents and the broader community; however we were able to train those who were allowed to offer rides to a relative or family member. We also partnered with Community Entry Services to offer rides to their clients on a weekly basis, and continued to reach out to homebound residents to serve the broader community.

Friends Of Pathways

recorded on the pathways. 700,000 counts notched on the trails. 600 middle schoolers received bike safety programming. 500 bike bells installed. 400 hours of FOP tent-time spent at 20 different locations. 300 trees cleared from the trails. 200 bike lights installed. 150 participated in Bike to Work Day. 10 additional miles of single-track trail built. 12 miles of winter trails groomed. 5 additional miles of pathway constructed and protected bike lanes installed. 2 new neighborhoods connected to the network.

Last year we were able to maintain the soccer field and upgrade equipment when needed.

Jackson Bronc Backers

Thank you for the generous support of the Old Bill's Fun Run, Jackson Bronc Backers was able to provide funding for 15 Jackson Hole Highschool Teams, as well as JHHS Speech and Debate team and Jackson Hole Middle School activities. The Jackson Bronc Backers general fund allows the funding of additional projects for example, bussing for summer camps and to state events, hotel room extended stay, and the training and development of coaches.

Jackson Elite Volleyball Club

Last year's Old Bill's Fun Run grant had an incredibly positive impact on over 55 middle and high school girls who participated in Jackson Elite Volleyball's 2023 season. By covering a significant amount of the club's coaching and court fees, grant funds allowed us to maintain participant fees at historic levels and to offer scholarships to all participants who requested them, ensuring our program was accessible across the community. Jackson Giants Baseball

Jackson Hole FC

Jackson Hole FC are excited to 'get back to normal' and we have engaged in more opportunities for our Club players to complete throughout the intermountain west and we are determined to revitalize the long tradition of the Jackson Hole Invitational; our home tournament that has been put on hold due to the Global pandemic. With over a hundred players, men and women, Jackson Hole FC is made up of players, coaches, moms and dads, officials, and spectators; the Club gives us all a sense of camaraderie as we help foster the growth of our younger players with goals of playing collegiate soccer and/or beyond. Funds generated from Old Bill's continue to help with the ever-increasing costs for facilities, services, insurance, and accommodations in Teton County and throughout the Region. The financial assistance provided by Old Bill's is essential for the participation of all of our players, especially our young adult players.

Jackson Hole Juggernauts Roller Derby

By offering this inclusive competitive sport the Jackson Hole Juggernauts give players, refs, and volunteers a safe environment to be original, active and healthy, creates a diverse community, and provide sports entertainment for an average 250 spectators. Post Covid we were able to rebuild the derby community and engage more members.

Jackson Hole Lacrosse Club

Old Bill's Fun Run grant makes our program possible. Our lacrosse club serves over 300 youth in our community over the course of the year. In 2022 there were over 260 youth who participated in the Spring Season program. There were 232 youth players in Fall 2022. Over 150 players participated in additional programs during the summer camps and clinics, and winter indoor programs. For many youths, participating on a Jackson Hole Lacrosse team is the most impactful and transformative experience in their lives. They receive world-class lacrosse coaching from coaches who are leaders, mentors, and role models. And they are part of a strong and healthy team that works together to strive towards a common goal. Their participation in the sport motivates them to be their best selves on the field, in the classroom, and their social lives.



Jackson Hole Ski & Snowboard Club

Funds from 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run helped JHSC successfully deliver winter sports programs and values-based education to over 500 local youth. We continue to meet a higher standard in program delivery, sustainability and staffing as a Silver Certified Club designated by US Ski & Snowboard. This funding supported student-athletes of all ages through our Student-Athlete Support Program with education in the following areas: sport specific focused nutrition, mental health awareness, one on one academic guidance, goal setting & executive function skills. This expanded support better serves our community of student-athletes in their pursuit of personal excellence. Because our programs are designed to support our student-athletes reach high levels of their sports, we continue to see high level results across all disciplines.

Jackson Hole Stingrays

The funds from last year's Fun Run allowed JH Stingrays to provide a space and coaching for swimmers in Teton County to grow as athletes and team members, as well as travel to competitive events around the region. We anticipate increased lane fees in the coming year as the Teton County Parks and Recreation Department adjusts its fee schedule and Old Bill's funds are critical to ensuring the team remains financially sound to carry out its mission.

Jackson Hole Wrestling Club

Support from Old Bill's Fund Run helps provide opportunities for Jackson Hole youth to learn discipline, mental toughness, and the benefits of hard work through the sport of wrestling. Jackson youth of all ages are able to learn and grow in this sport and are provided with equipment, space and training to prepare them to compete locally, regionally and nationally.

Jackson Hole Youth Baseball - Cal Ripken Division

An affordable recreational activity for over 245 children in our community which teaches an active, healthy lifestyle, and lifelong skills of sportsmanship and teamwork. Thanks to Old Bill's we are able to keep our costs down and offer scholarships to kids that want to play the game. Last year we were able to add one more travel team to our club because the numbers were so high in participation. Continuing this same activity in the community makes us all unite and become stronger in our relationships of team building and community building.

Jackson Hole Youth Basketball

Thanks to the support of Old Bill's we were able to continue growing our programs to include over 275 local youth. The organization continues to grow with the help of dedicated families, board members, and staff. Jackson Hole Youth Basketball is pleased to partner with Teton County Parks and Recreation and the Jackson Hole High School basketball programs to offer leagues, camps, clinics, and tournaments throughout the year to boys and girls grades 1 through 12. We hope to continue our programs by expanding and improving on our coaching and helping to instill the core values of JHYB which are: growth mindset, effort, learning, freedom to make mistakes, and respect for the game.

Jackson Hole Youth Mountain Biking

OBFR funds helped JHYMB continue to operate during our 2022 season, registering 80 middle and high school student athletes. These riders were led by 35 licensed volunteer coaches in more than 50 weekly mountain bike practices in the Idaho League of the National Interscholastic Cycling Association. The team also participated in local trail cleanup maintenance efforts and volunteer days. We continue to provide quality mountain bike programming to young athletes and to grow lifelong mountain bikers and cyclists.

Jackson Hole Youth Soccer

Jackson Hole Youth Soccer (JHYS) impacts a large segment of our local community. We operate soccer programs in the spring, fall, as well indoor training / league play in the winter and camps during the summer. Last year JHYS had approximately 850 players with 1,100 total registrations for our programs. Players represent a wide spectrum (3U to 19U). In total, JHYS provides healthy after school options for roughly 30% of all kids in local



schools. Our programs provide a positive impact on the education and development of children in the Jackson Hole community. We teach the ethics of hard work, the benefits of teamwork, self and team discipline along with the satisfaction of putting in the effort to achieve goals. Donations from Old Bill's are critical to our success as it allows JHYS to keep registration fees as low as possible. We remain grateful for the support we receive from the community.

Jackson Youth Hockey

Our Old Bill's contribution was used for scholarships for new and current players, new uniforms, additional player programming, coaching education, creating more opportunities for our local athletes to experience the great game through better instruction and coaching.

JH Pony Club

Jackson Hole is a challenging community to provide affordable riding lessons to young people. Old Bill's helped make riding lessons available for its young members through the summer months.

JH Winter Wonderland Ice rink on the square

The development of JHWW has become multi-faceted in its ability to meet needs within the community and add to the tourist experience of Jackson Hole. Through OBFR, we provided public skating opportunities during after school hours and weekends, an affordable family activity for the community and tourists alike. We provide a distinctive character to Town Square and the Teton Village commons, bringing vitality to the valley during the winter. This year we serviced over 5,500 participants, including multiple repeat families, youths, locals, and tourists.

Scouts BSA - Troop 268

We are also fortunate to live in a community that has the Old Bill's fundraiser. Old Bill's has given life to so many organizations in Jackson that would not be able to continue their missions or to deliver their services to this community in the manner that they do without Old Bill's. Troop 268 from Jackson is able to offer our scouts so many opportunities that we would not be able to do otherwise without this fundraiser. Our youth in our community are forever grateful to this fundraiser and the opportunities it gives us from scout camps, community service, leadership opportunities and so much more. Jackson is a much better community because of the generosity of this fundraiser from youth programs, wildlife conservation, and so much more. Thank you Old Bill's.

Skating Club of Jackson Hole

Funds received through Old Bill's Fun Run assist in providing quality coaching, expertise, and equipment usage, while keeping the price affordable to all. Our programs fill a much-needed role for healthy activity during the critical after-school hours by providing a safe, structured environment for the children of working parents. Our goal is to provide after-school extracurricular activities that help build confidence and self-esteem which can boost academic performance, reduce risky behaviors, and promote physical and mental health. Funds from Old Bill's Fun Run also assisted in purchasing costumes for the annual Holiday on Ice performance. This holiday production is one of the most widely attended performances in Teton County, providing an opportunity for friends, family, and community members to witness the culmination of all the hard work and dedication from the skaters in our program. Skaters who participated in the Holiday on Ice ranged in age from 3 years old through adult.

Teton Back Country Horsemen

We finished installing the tie-up areas at the Turpin Meadows trail head where many equestrians begin or end their journeys into the back country. We are hosting the statewide Back Country Horsemen Rendezvous which will bring about 200 equestrians into the valley this fall (after the community's busy season begins to slow down), many of which help with trail maintenance in the Teton Wilderness and other locations around the State.

Teton Backcountry Alliance

TBCA has dedicated efforts this year towards responsible backcountry use, public education on Teton Bighorn



sheep, the proposed expansion of Grand Targhee Resort, a free Teton Pass shuttle, uphill travel at Snow King, participation in the BT Planning process, and many other topics related to its mission. There is good evidence that TBCA's work is making a significant difference to our community and ecosystem.

Teton Climbers' Coalition

The Old Bill's funds allowed us to continue to serve our community in the following ways: Initiated the Climbing Area Management (CAM) Project to monitor, inspect and replace aging bolts throughout the Jackson Hole area. Developed "best-practice" guidelines for new route development in Jackson Hole area. Led numerous Adopt-A-Crag Stewardship Projects. Helped secure final approval for full scope of Rec Center climbing gym. Collaborated on coordinated approach to management of Teton bighorn sheep and winter recreation. Debuted the inaugural AlpinFilm film festival. Partnered with Teton County Parks & Rec to ensure continuation of Town Pump bouldering series.

Teton County/Jackson Parks and Recreation

The funds that are raised from Old Bill's Fun Run for Parks and Recreation go towards our scholarship program. This has helped 25 families to date be able to attend our summer camp program. More than ever families are going to need this assistance to be able to provide their child an experience that will have a meaningful impact. While allowing the working parent to feel their child has a place that is safe, full of great experiences, and allowing them the opportunity to have a fun summer while easing the financial burden for the family.

Teton Disc Golf Club

In 2022 Teton Disc Golf Club provided disc golf clinics to over 100 young community members providing them with instruction on how to play the game and a disc to keep so that they could play again without any financial barriers. Teton Disc Golf Club also ran summer disc golf leagues and a tournament to cultivate a local disc golf community.

Teton Freeriders

The funds from Old Bill's Fun Run last year were used for trail maintenance, repair, and administrative expenses. The trail system in Teton County continues to see an exponential increase in users each year. With the help of these funds, we were able to put 3,676 paid labor hours and 1,810 volunteer labor hours back into the community trails system. We greatly appreciate the support of Old Bill's Fun Run.

Teton Trail Runners

Teton Trail Runners uses Old Bill's Fun Run grants to create organized running opportunities to explore our public lands.

Women in the Tetons (formerly Jackson Hole Babe Force)

Grant funds directly funded women's participation in Avy I courses led by AAI and JHMG. Funds also supported multiple free outdoor meet-ups, including a Rad Moms ski program and Nordic ski instruction.

Wyoming Pathways
